We truly appreciate the outstanding job Dr. Escott and the Board have done.

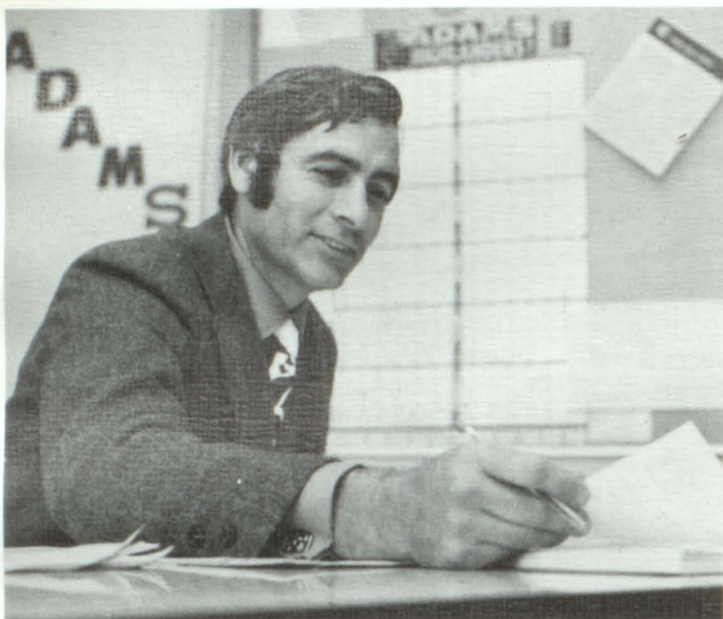

Even though not much is said about these two groups, the students and faculty appreciate the fine job they do.



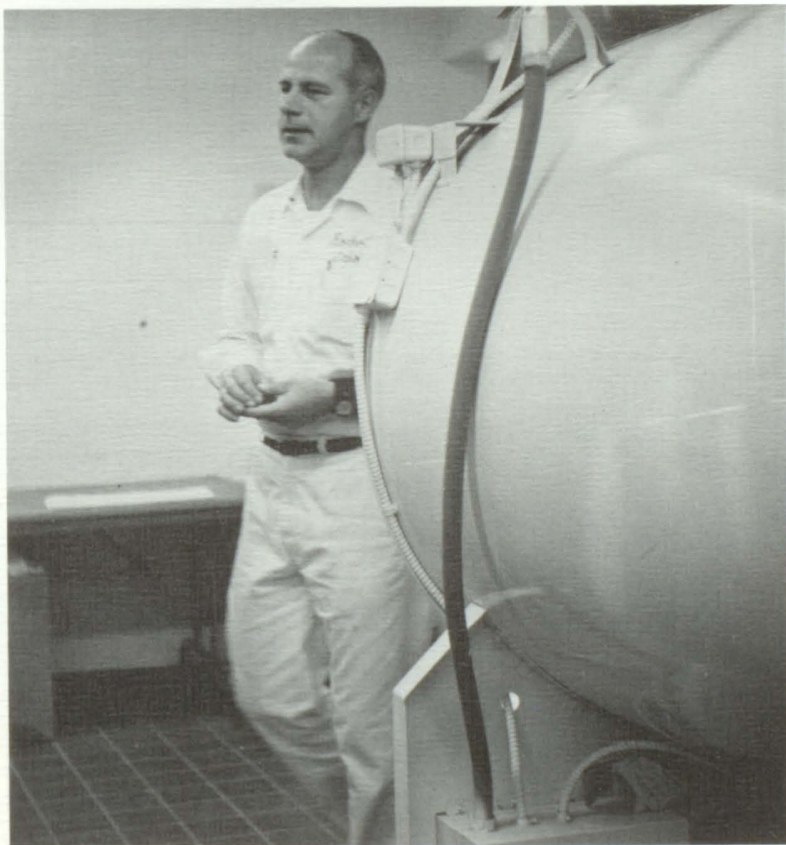

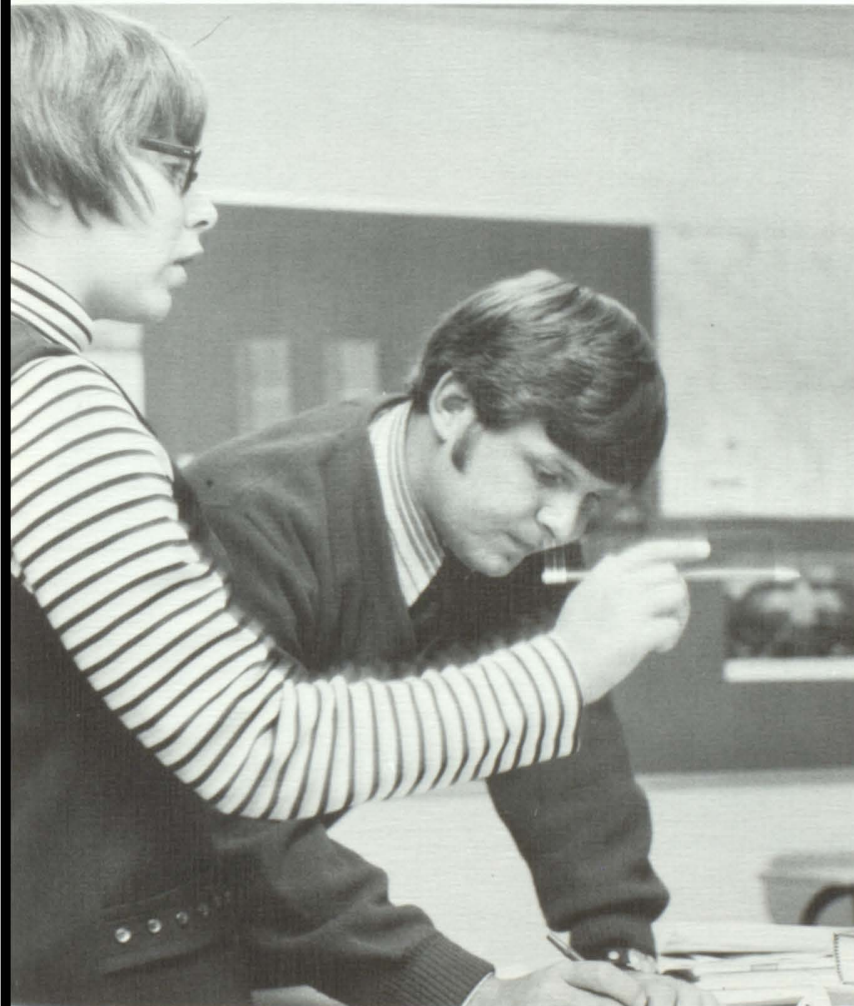
## Journalism III by Any Other Name Is—Yearbook

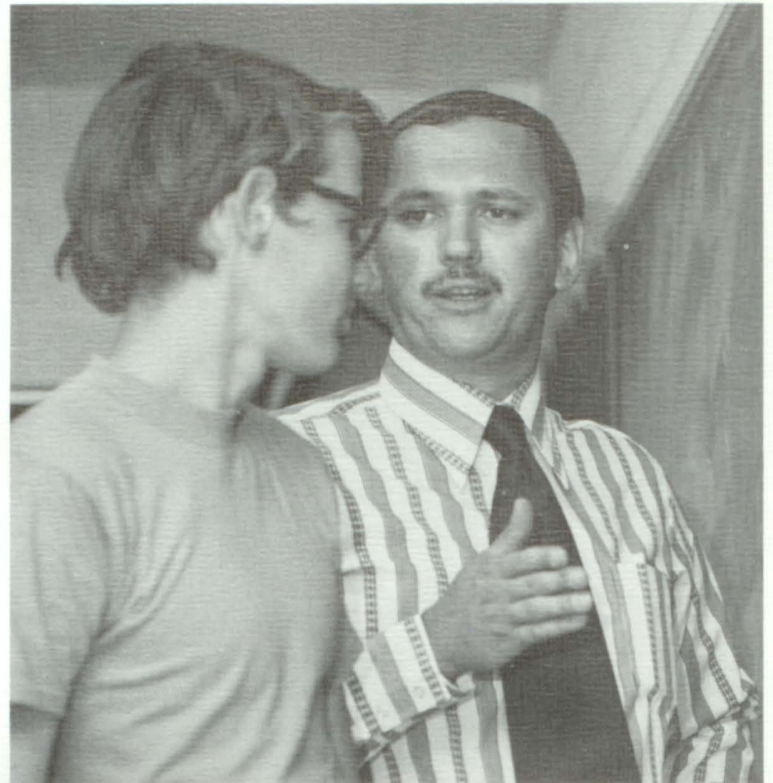
# Math Teachers, Students Work Best in 1-1 Correspondence

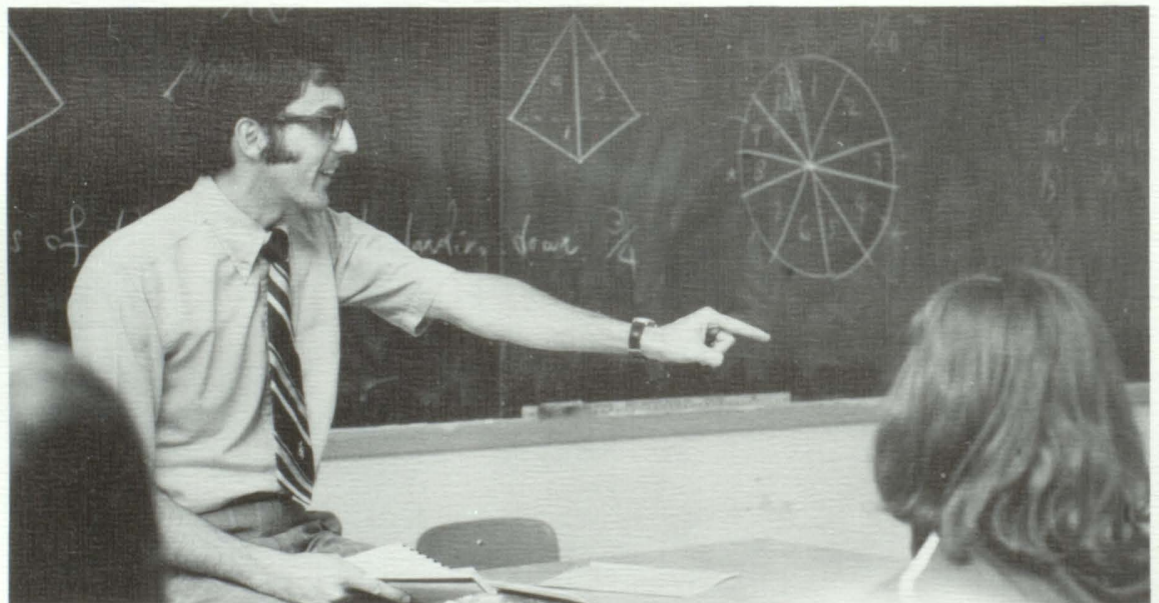

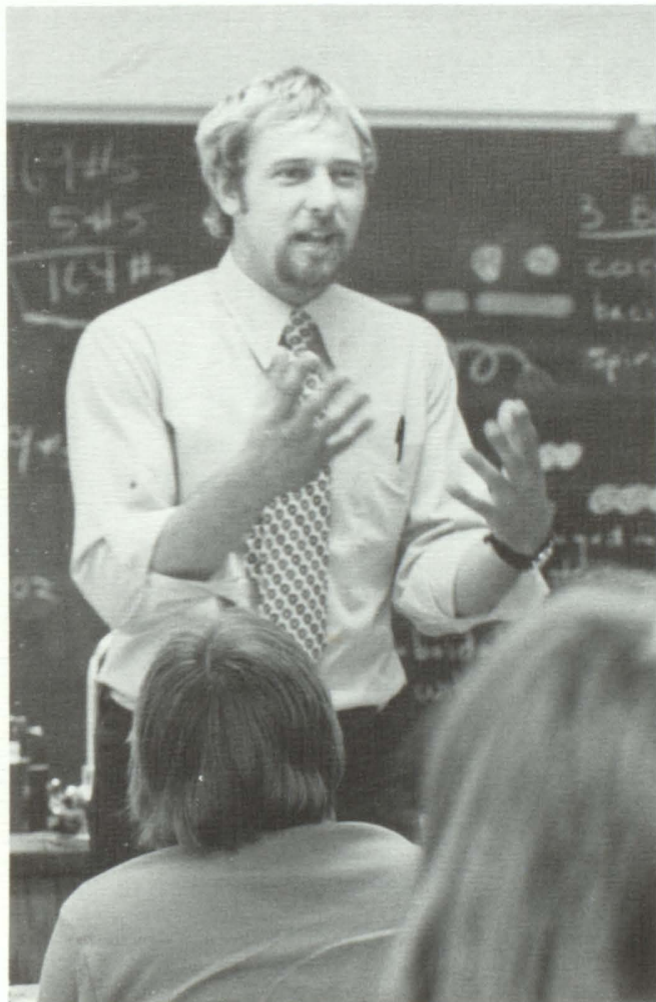

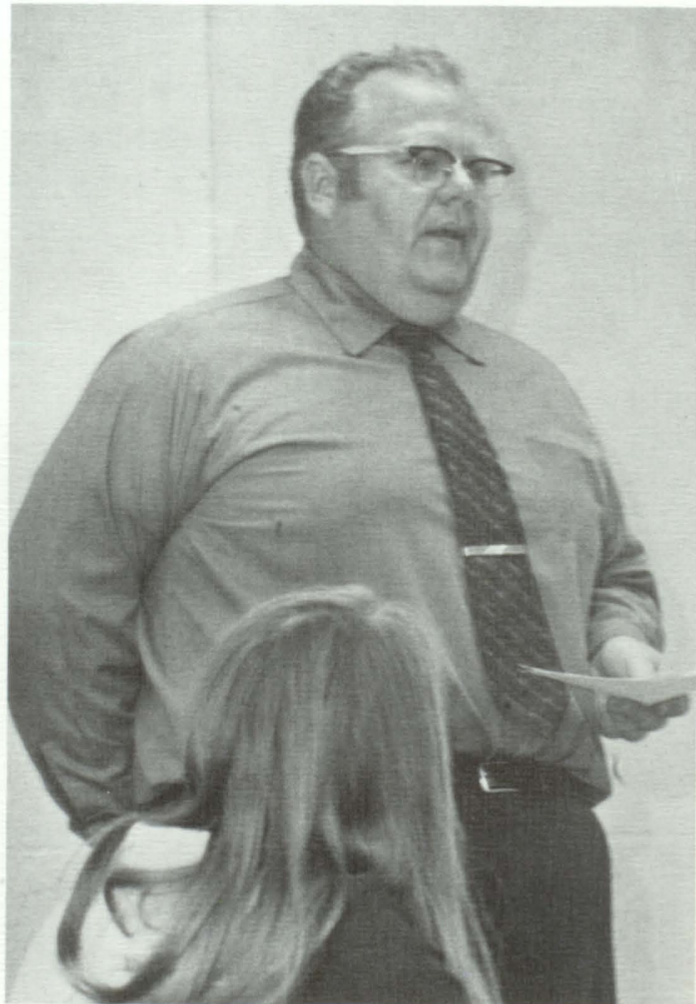
In all, the Science Department is much more fascinating and exciting than last year. The student who wants to develop his ability to think critically and analytically will enjoy the "new" Science program.

A series was also planned to have speakers enlighten eighteen year-olds as to their rights and responsibilities as adults, now that the voting age has been lowered to eighteen.

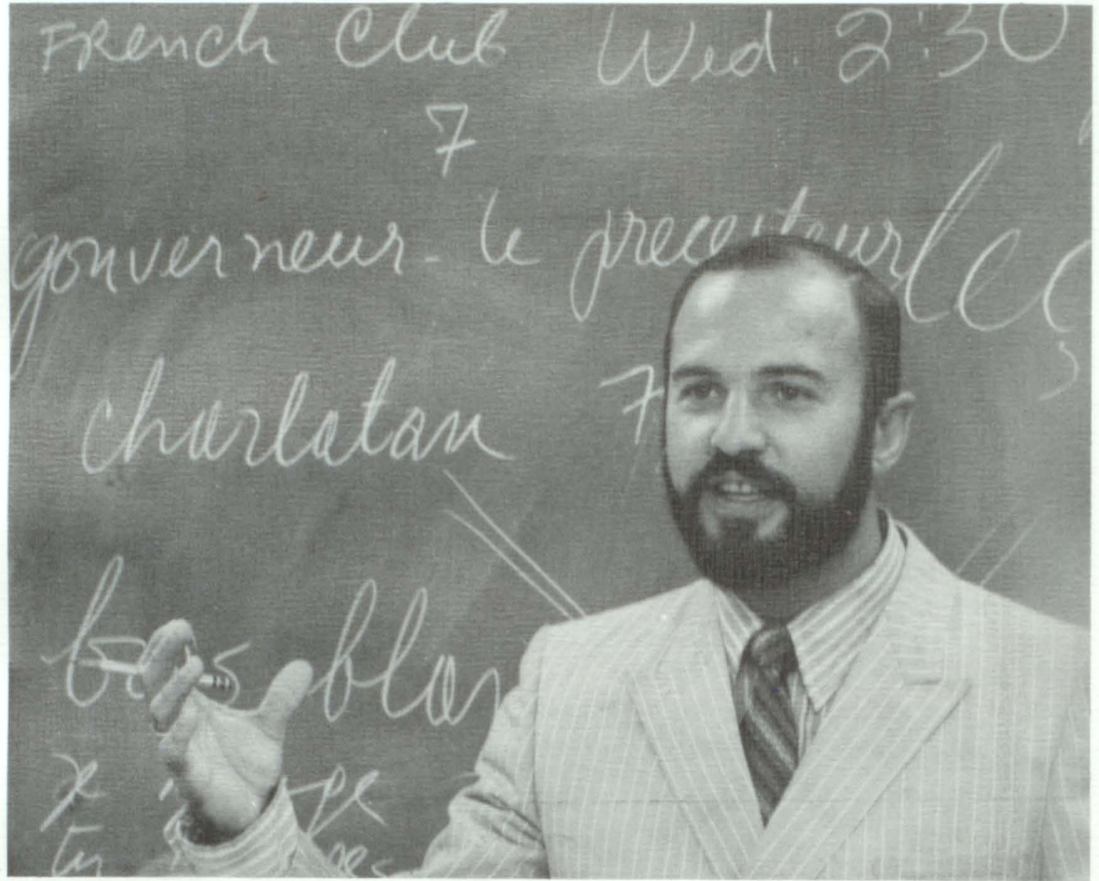
This year will definitely be labeled in our "history books" as a successful one for both students and teachers.

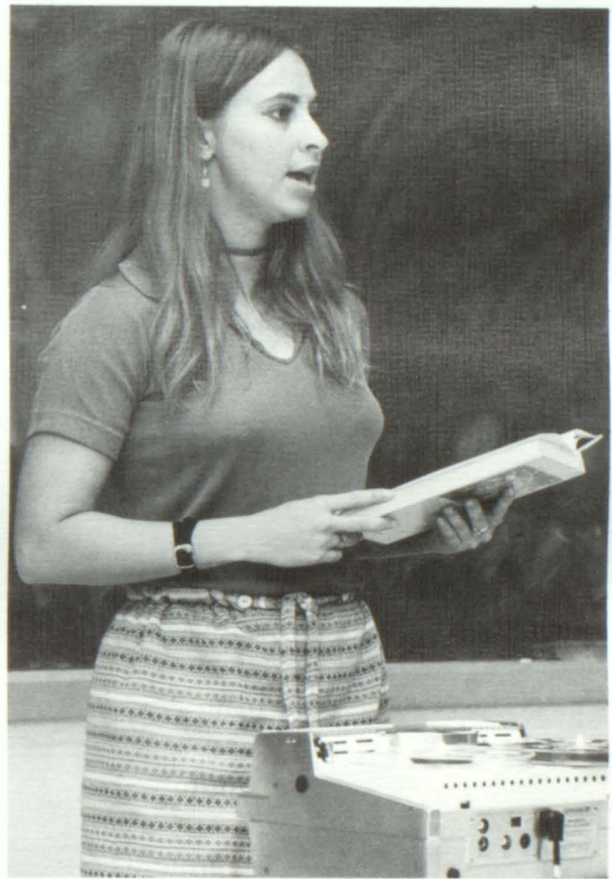

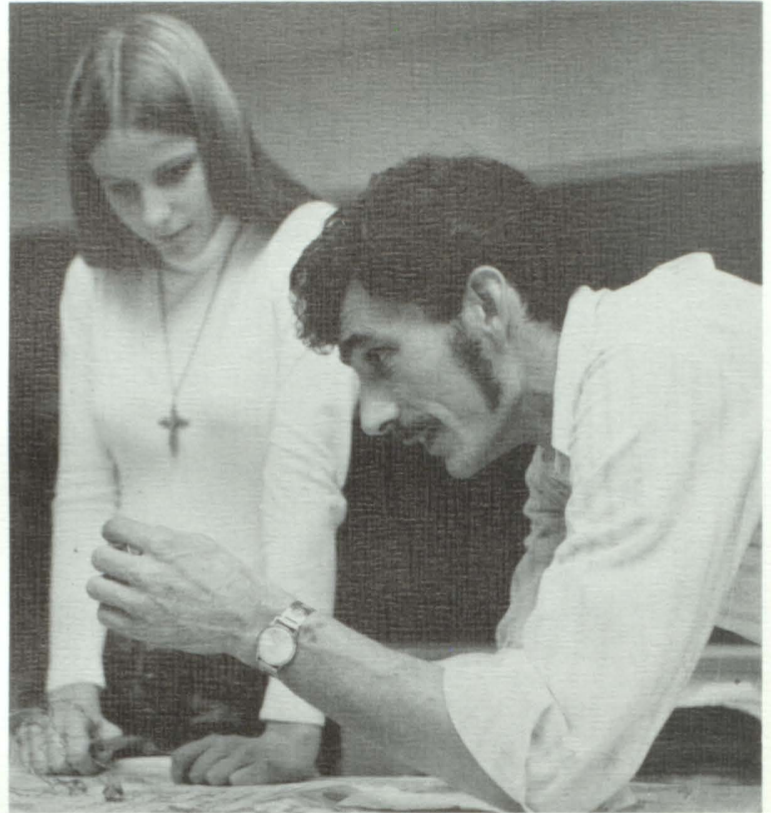
Because of the overwhelming success of the new mini courses, a new teacher, Mrs. Spitzer, has been added to the Art Department. The courses offered include Drawing, Painting, Sculpture, Jewelry, Printmaking, Commercial Art, and Weaving.

One of the exciting events of the sculpture class was producing a live face cast. This is when plaster is applied to the face, then removed leaving a mold of the face. The mold can then be used to make clay or cement faces.

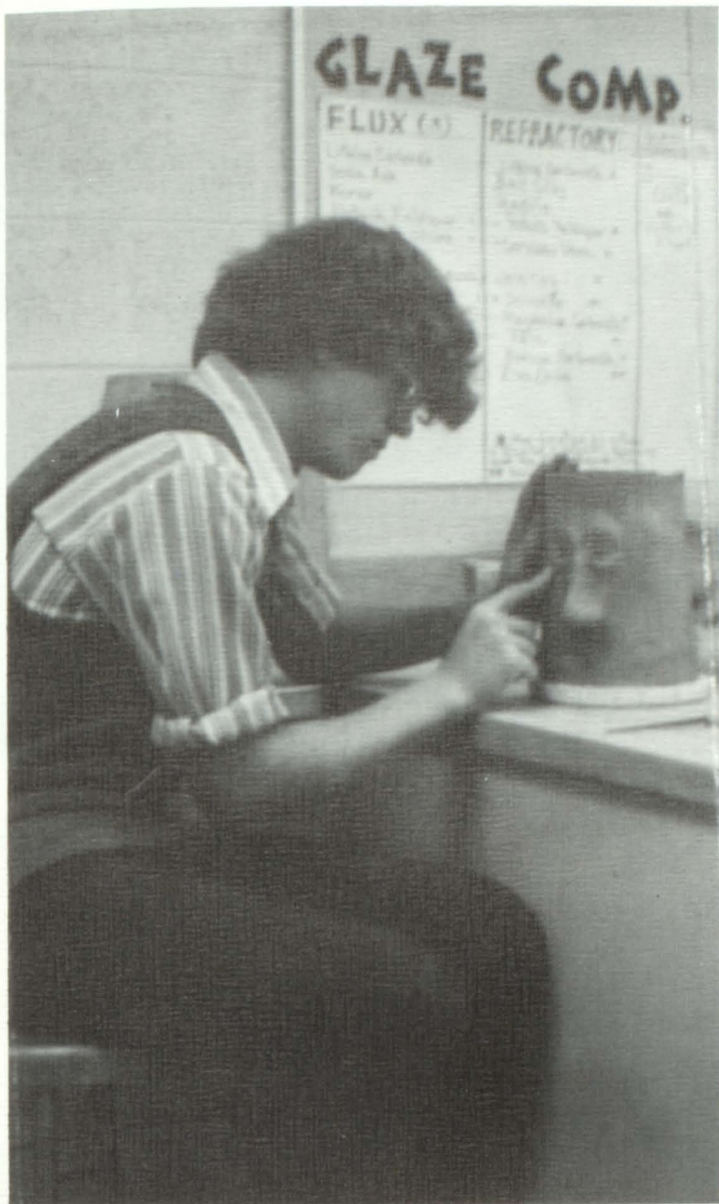

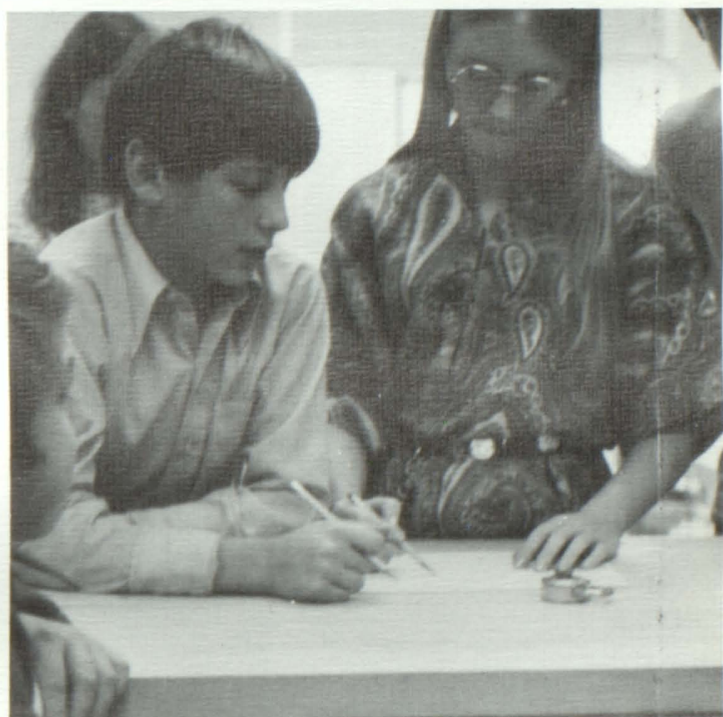

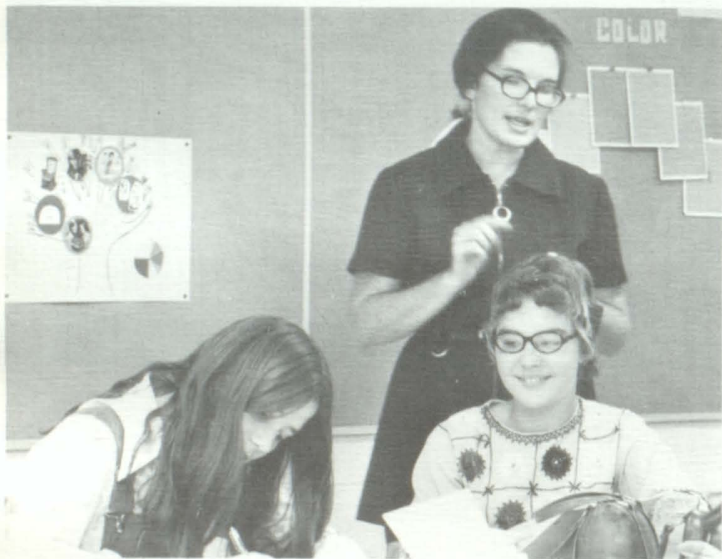

Due to these changes, Adams has the most enjoyable, worthwhile and most rewarding gym classes ever.

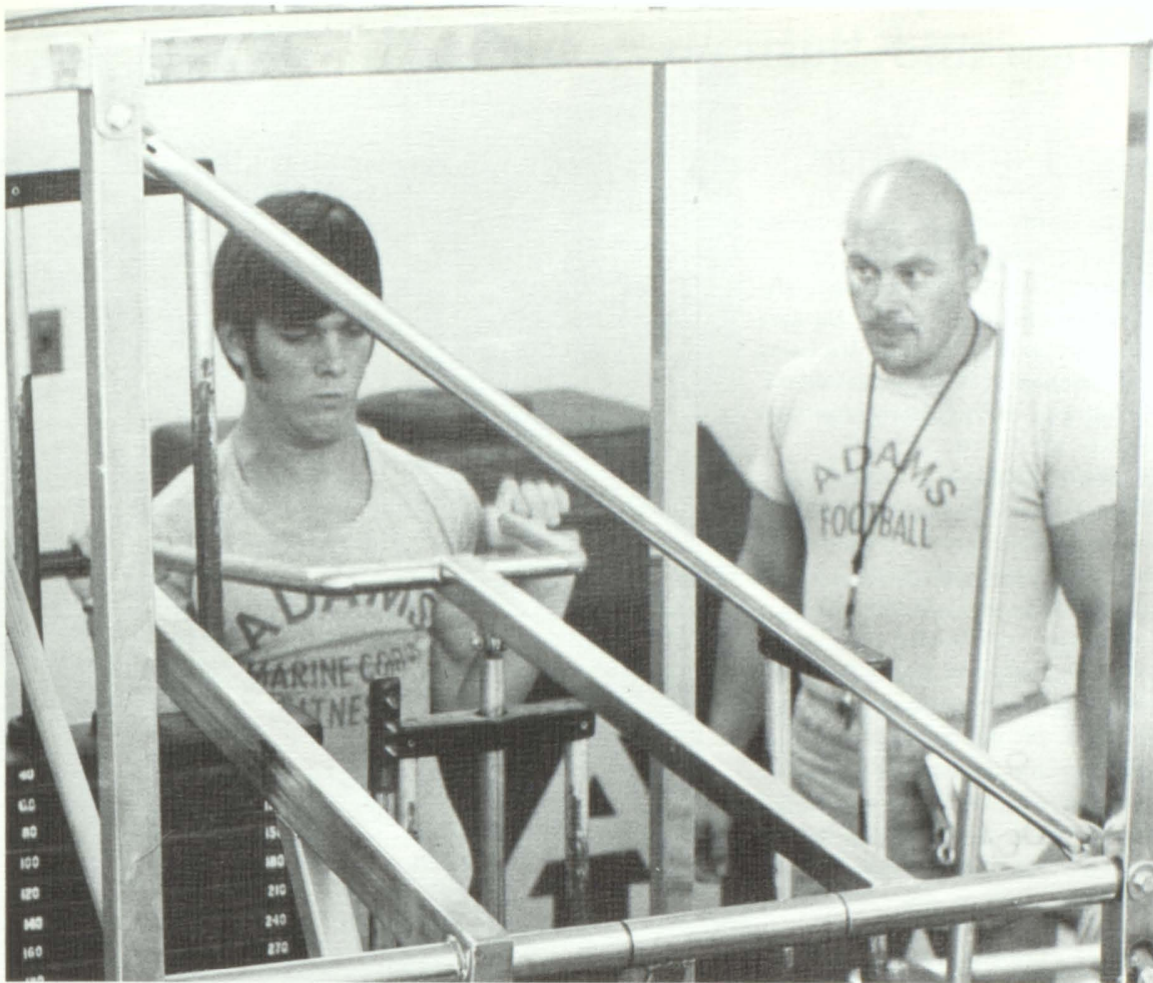

# Future Businessmen and Businesswomen Start Careers Early

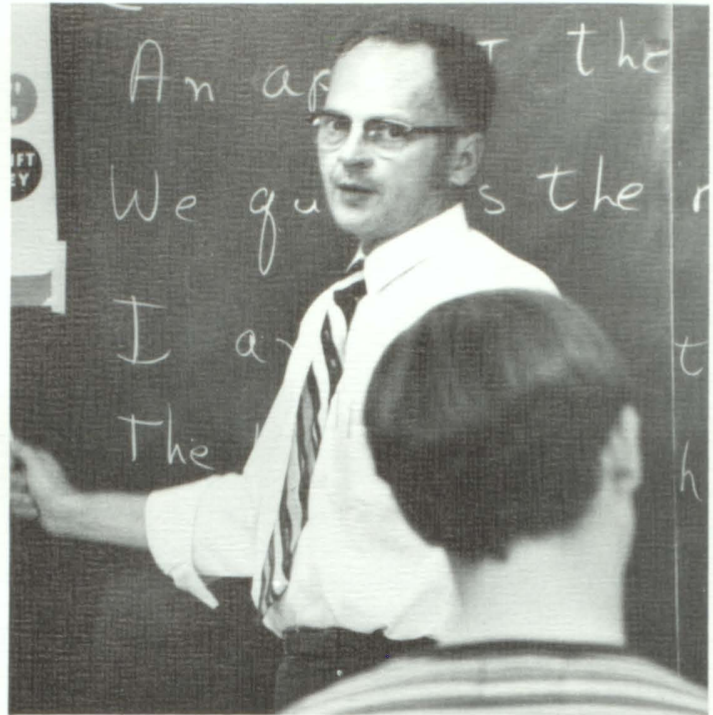
Speed and accuracy are the key words when it comes to the accomplishments of this year's Business Department.

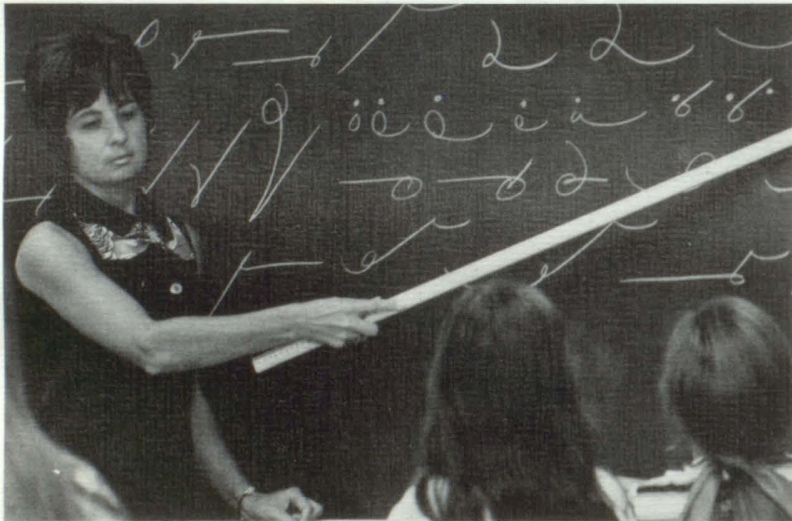

The teachers hope to add a new program to the curriculum. Sometime in the future, they would like to offer the students ten-week courses in the business area of the student's choice.

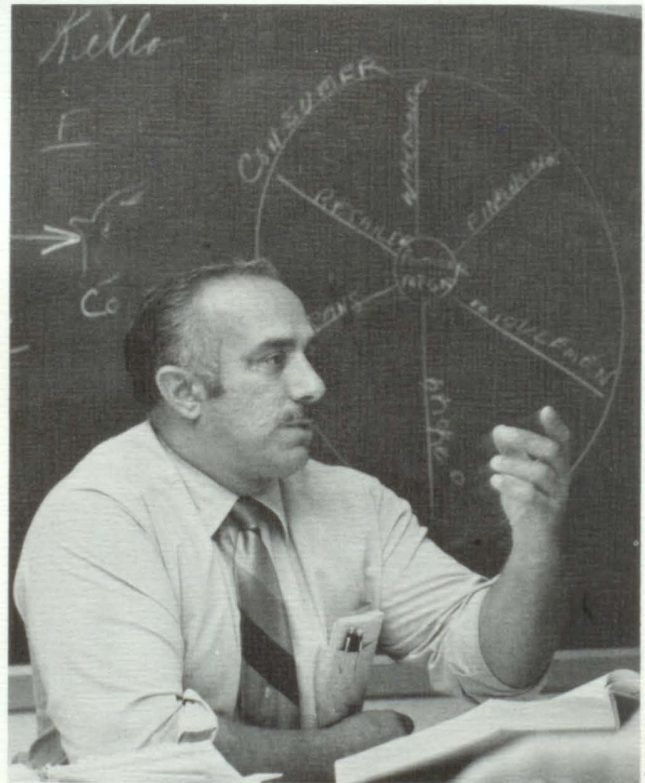

## New Department Prepares Students for Employment

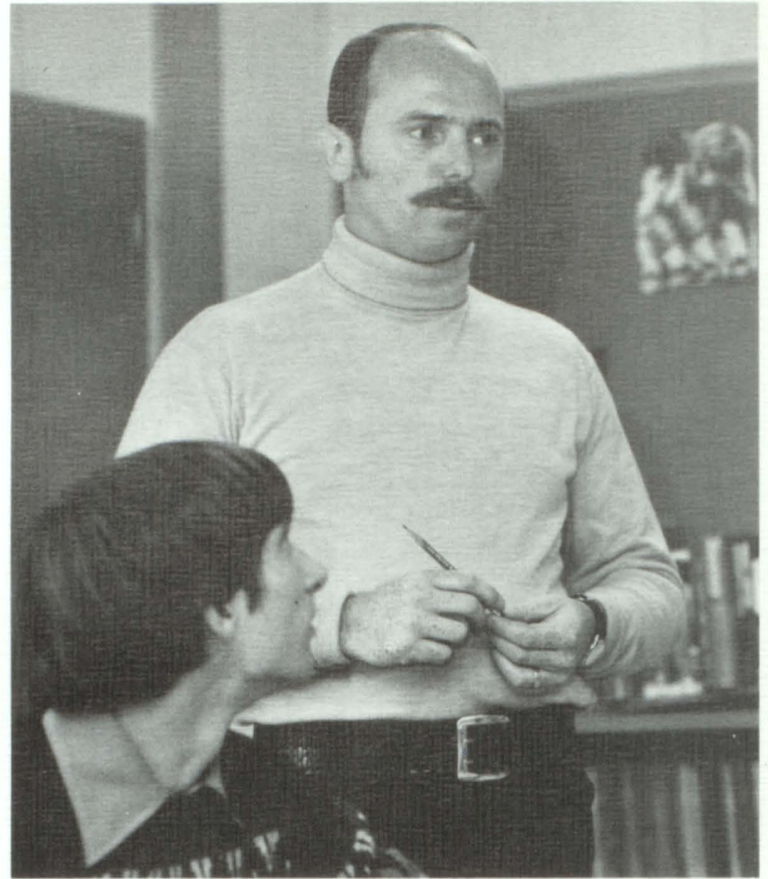
A new department was added to Adams High School last September. Rochester's Vocational Adjustment Department was transferred from Rochester High School to the facilities here at Adams.

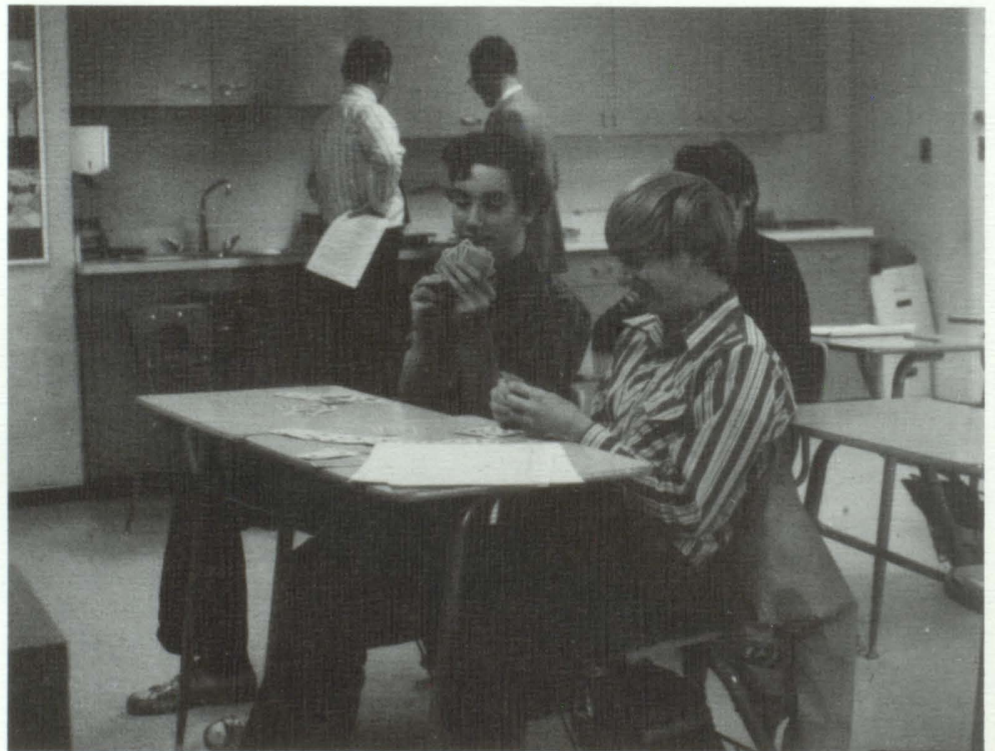
Mr. Swift is hoping for a complete Home Ec set-up at Adams to train students in cooking and other subjects they begin studying at the Northeast Vocational School.

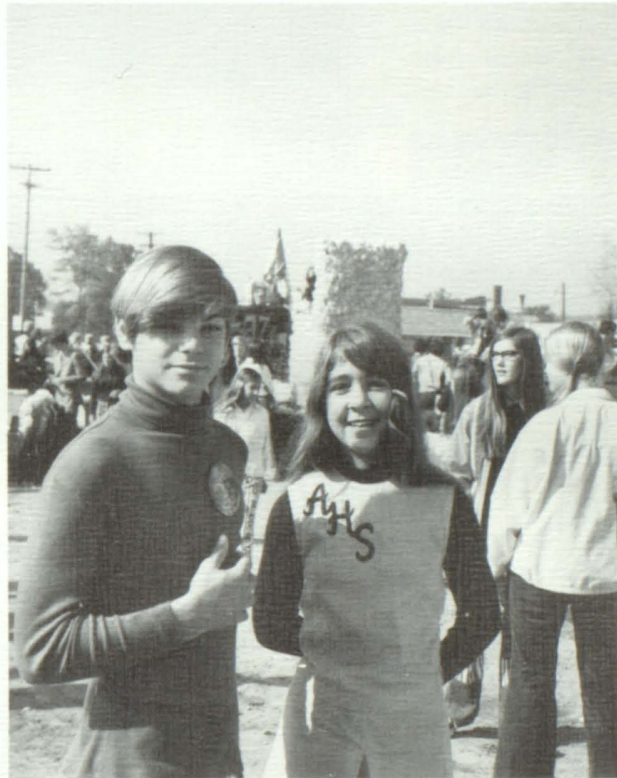

Because of such spirited participation by the students, Spirit Week was a smashing success.

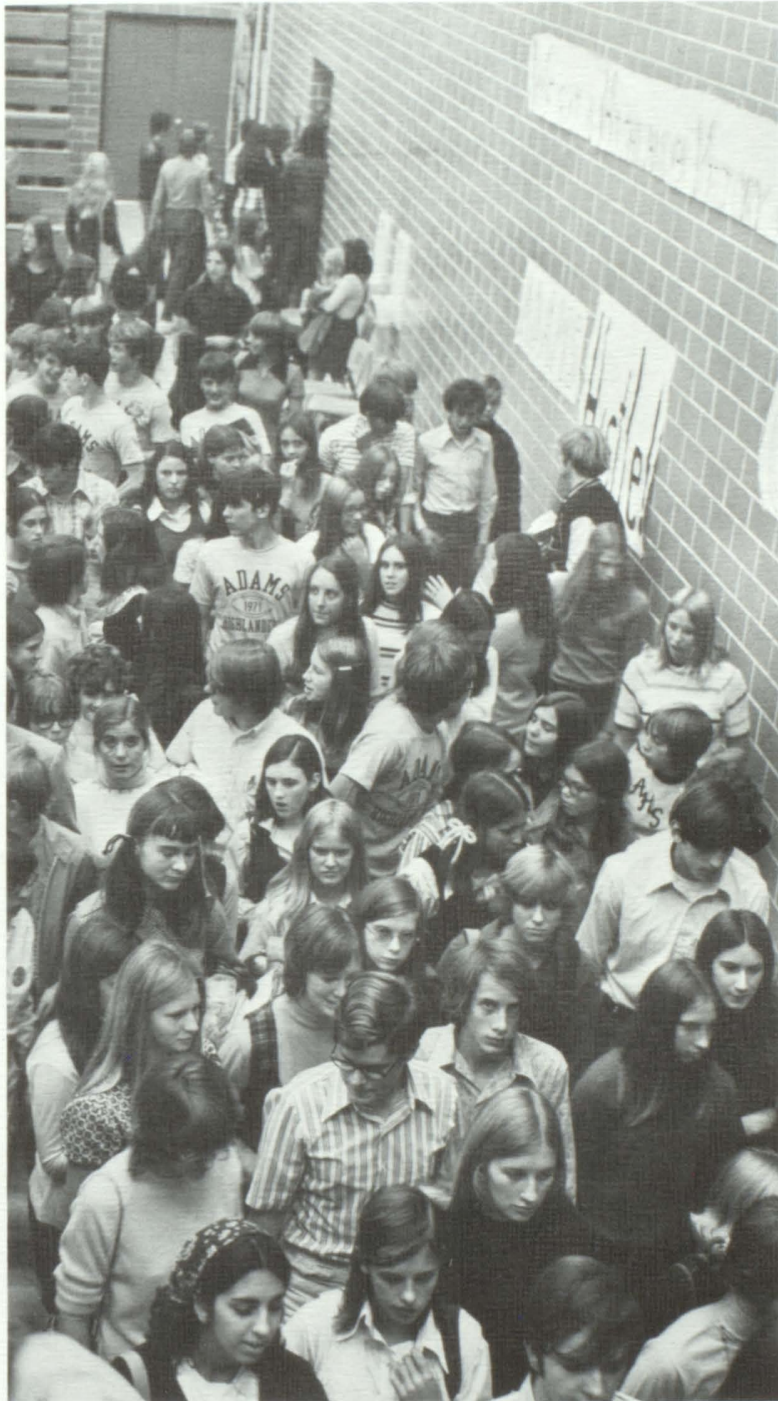

## Sunny Skies Smile on AHS Homecoming Festivities

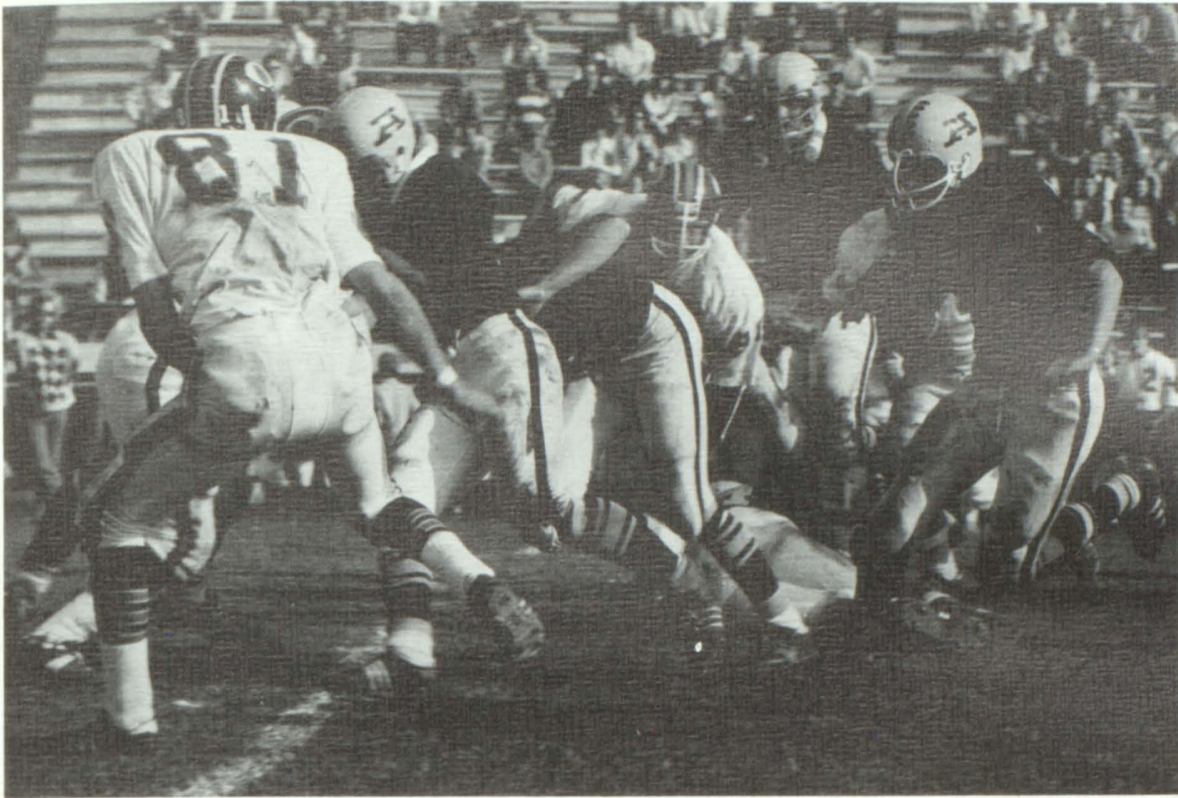

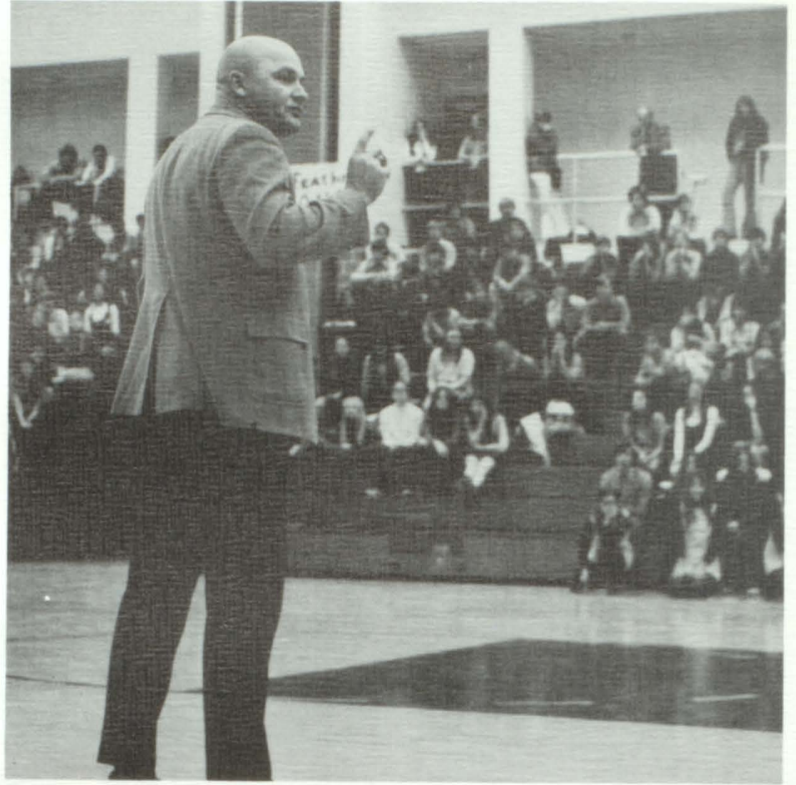
# Students Radiate Enthusiasm During Various Assemblies

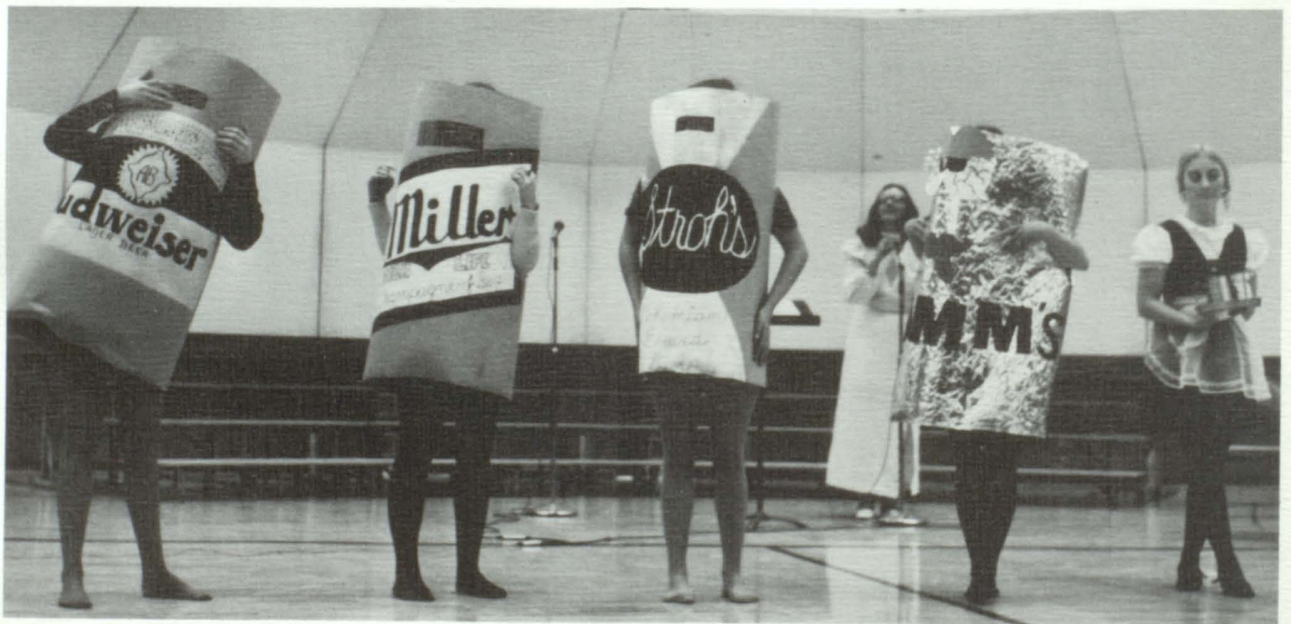

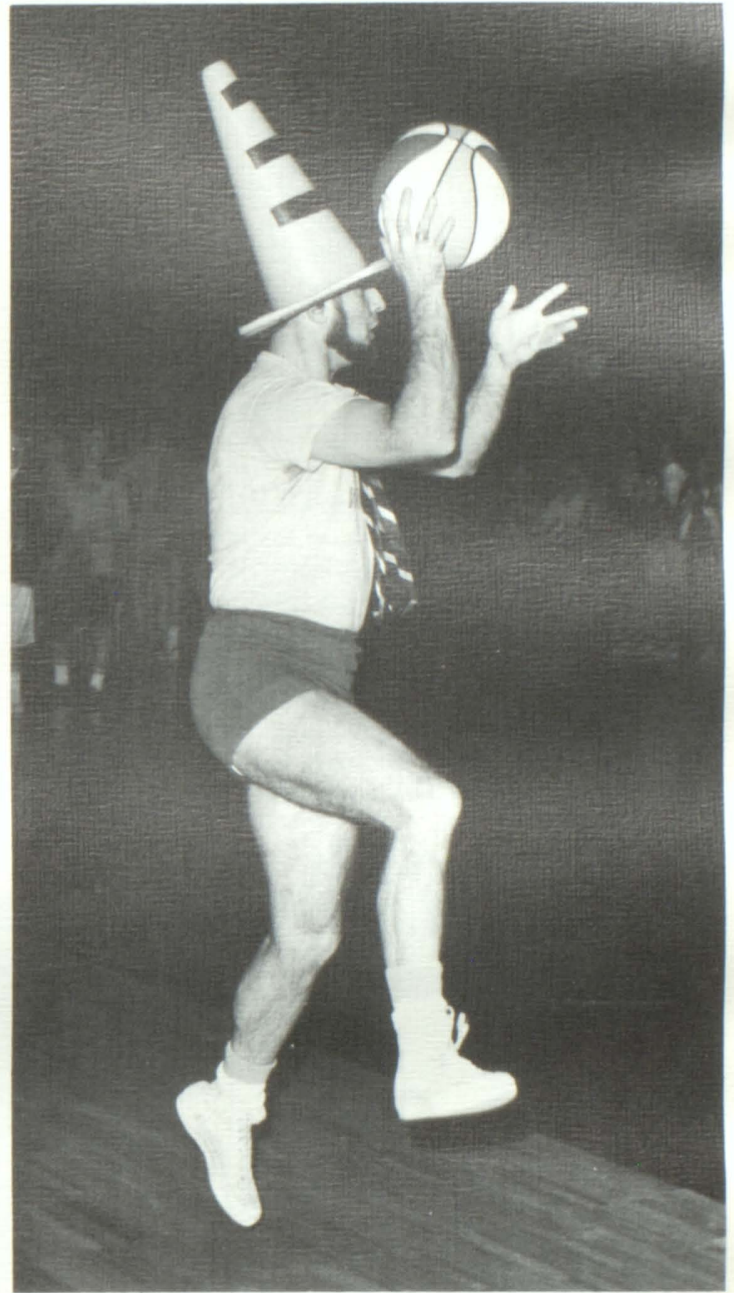
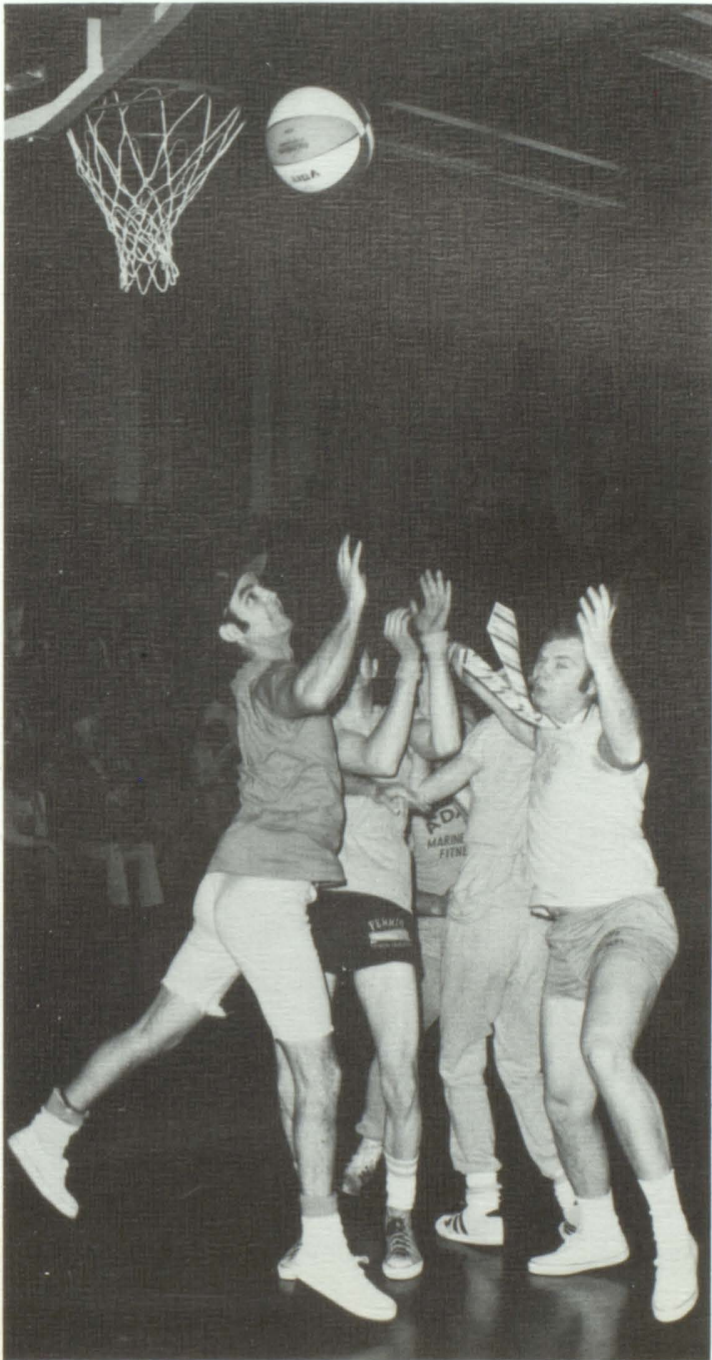
## Varsity Club and Faculty Tie It Up (Basketball, Chapter 2)

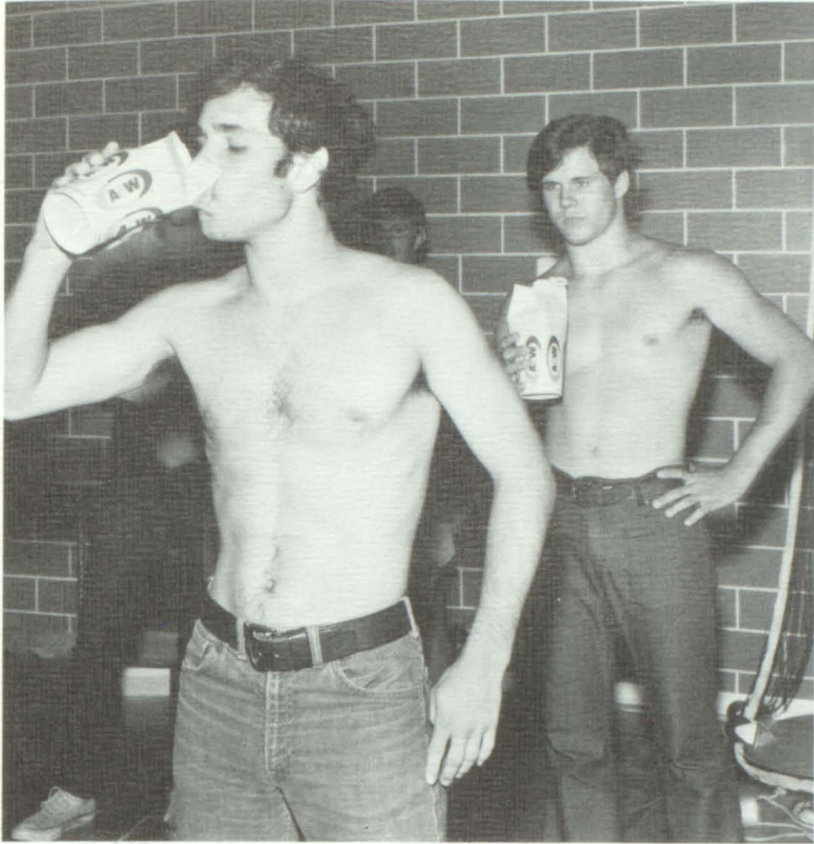

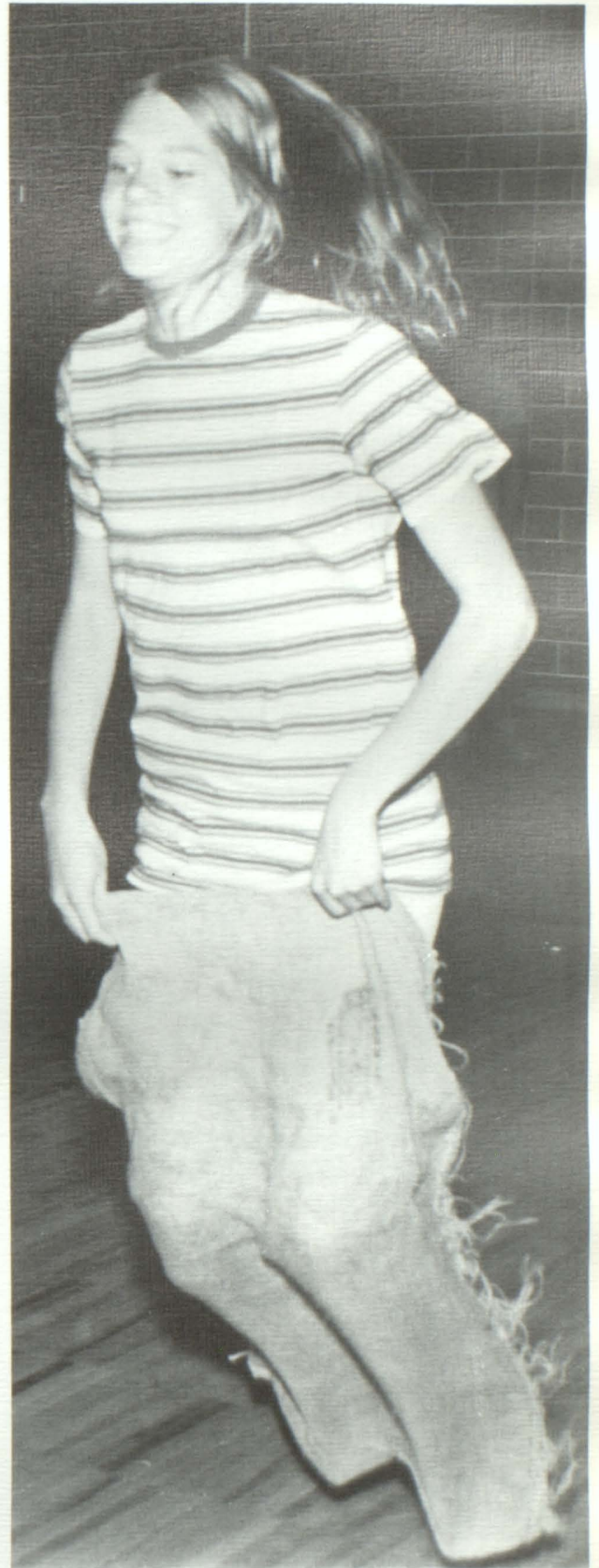

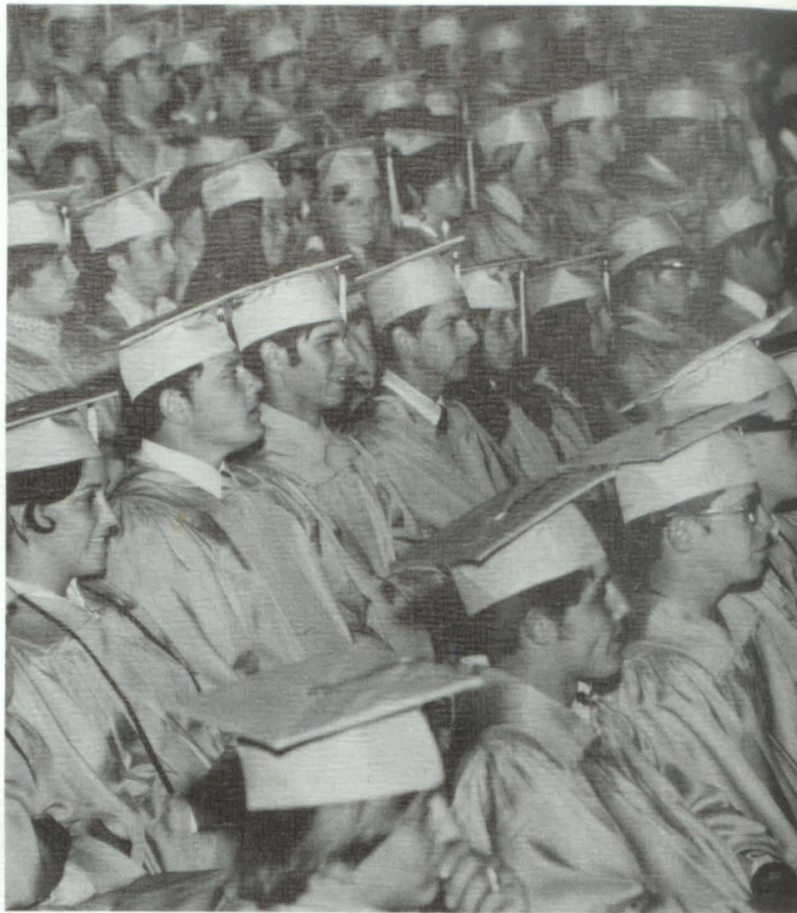

# Graduation Is the End and Beginning for Class of '71

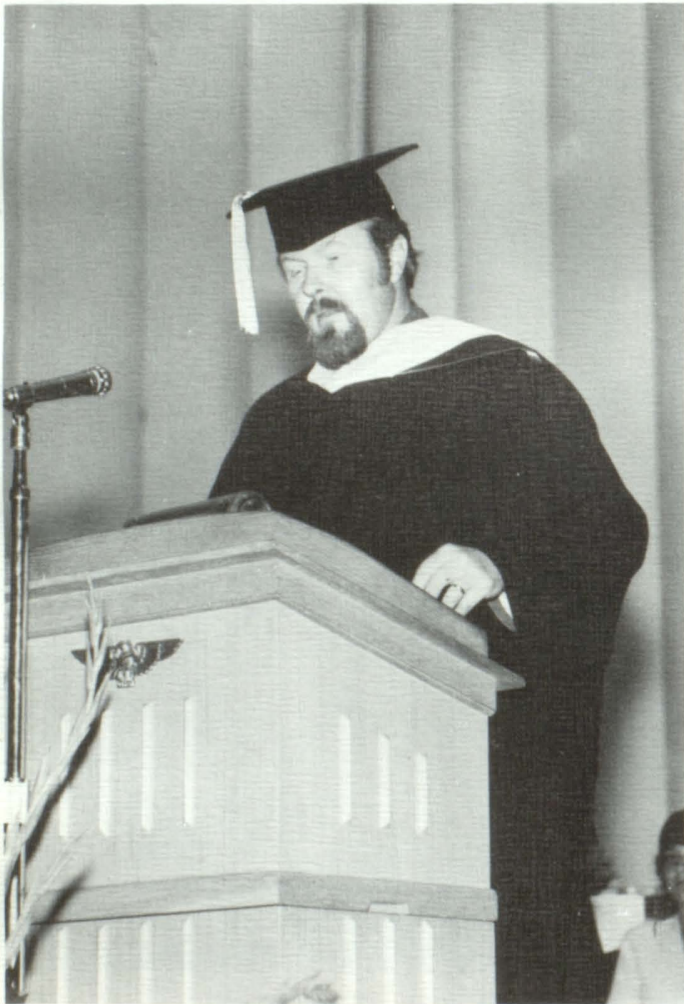
The closing of a school year is a very special time for Seniors. The closing of the 1970-1971 school year was such a time for the Class of '71.

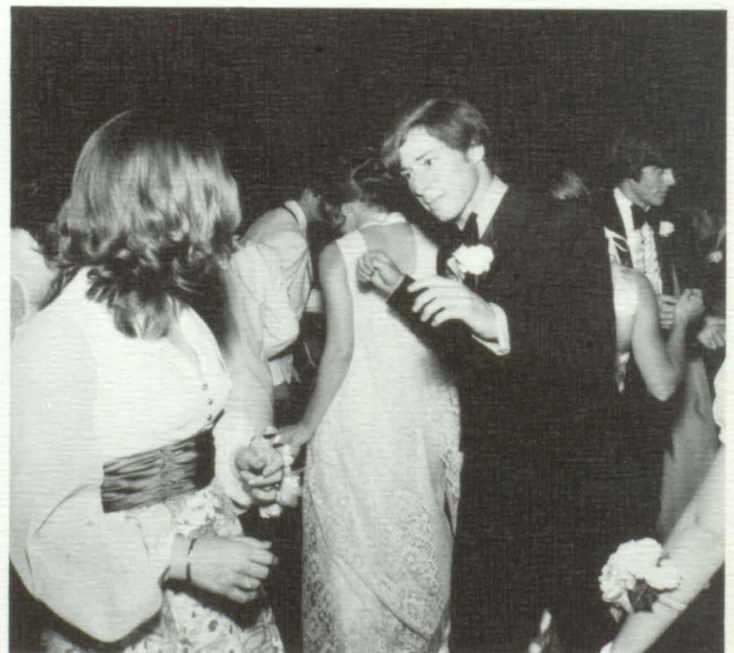

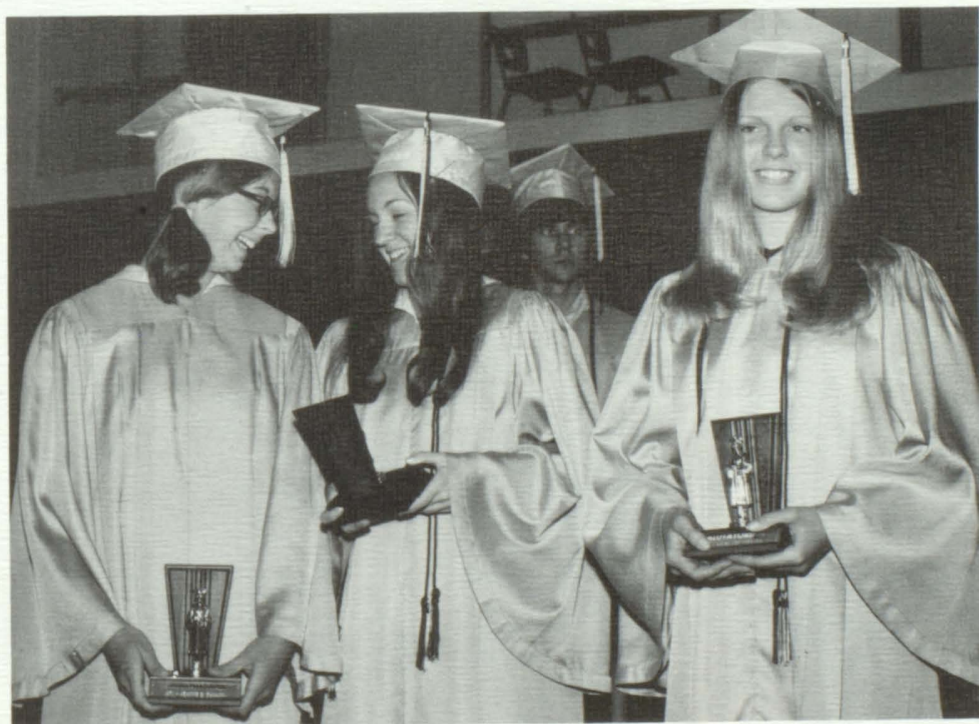

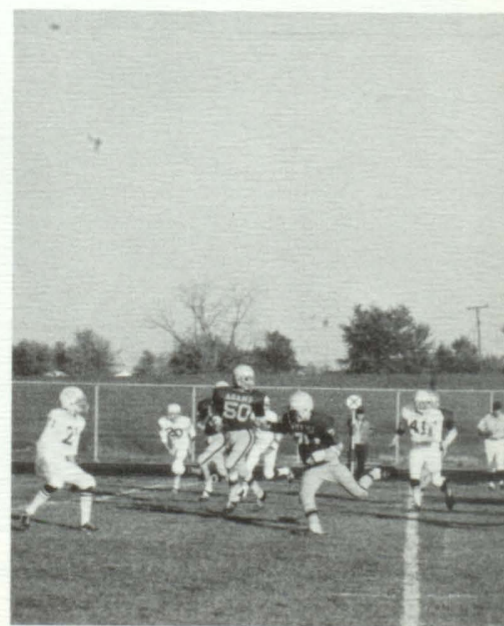

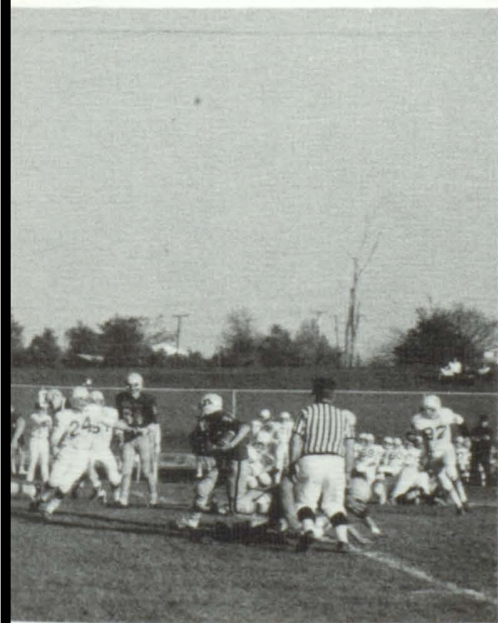
It was a great team effort that led the Freshmen to the League title. Coaches Cheney and Barnard hope that the players they have to work with in the future will provide more championship teams.

Cross Country is a sport that requires a great deal of work and Adams' harriers proved they could do it.



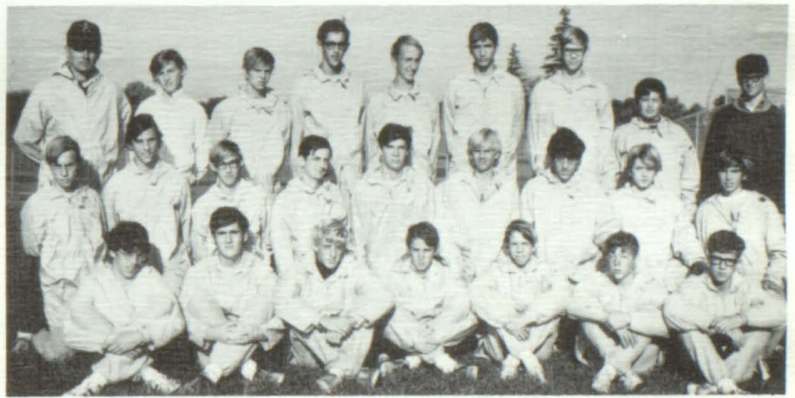

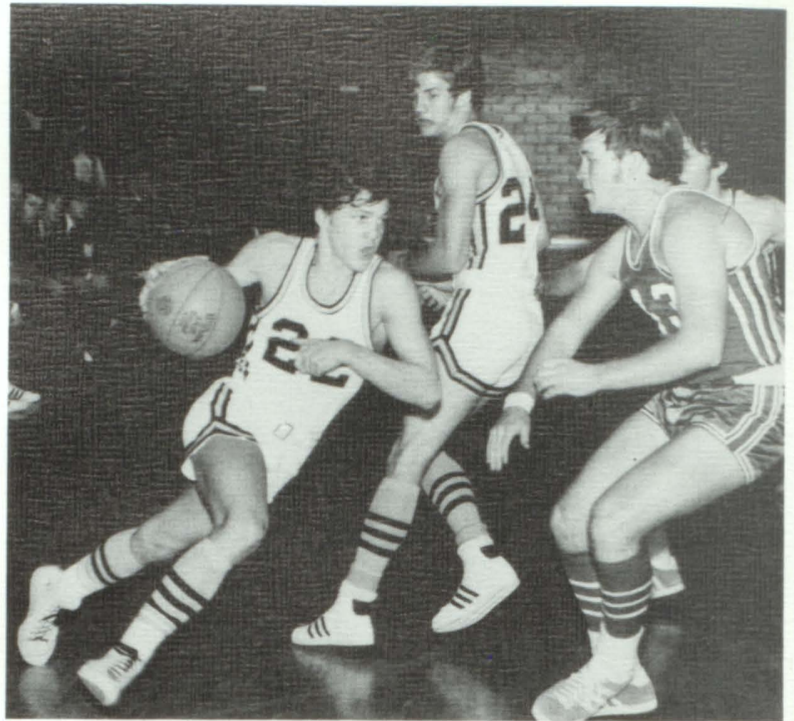
# Varsity Basketball Team Has Best Season Ever

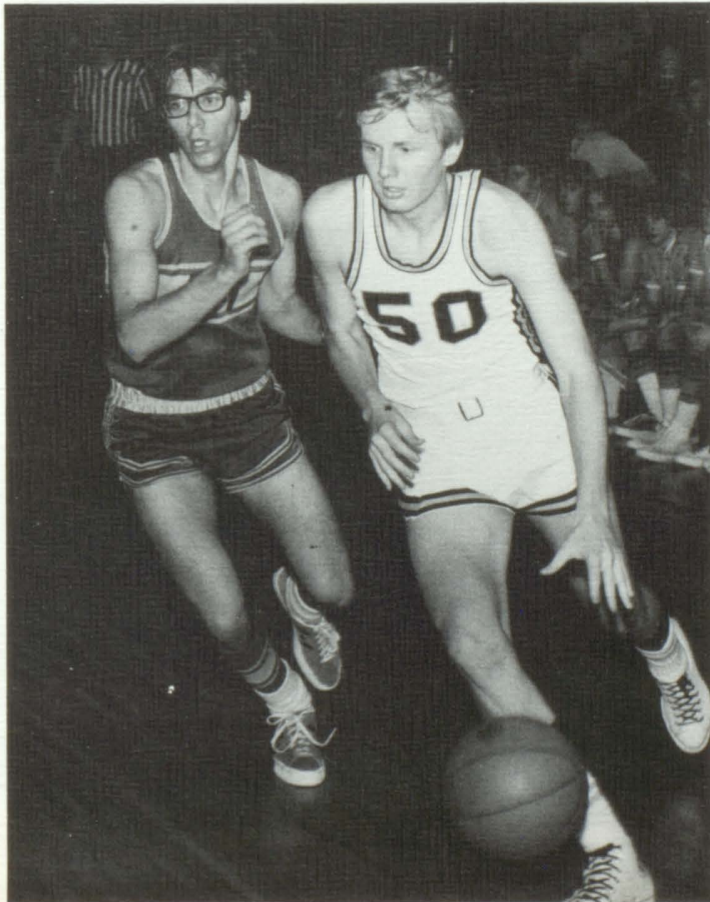

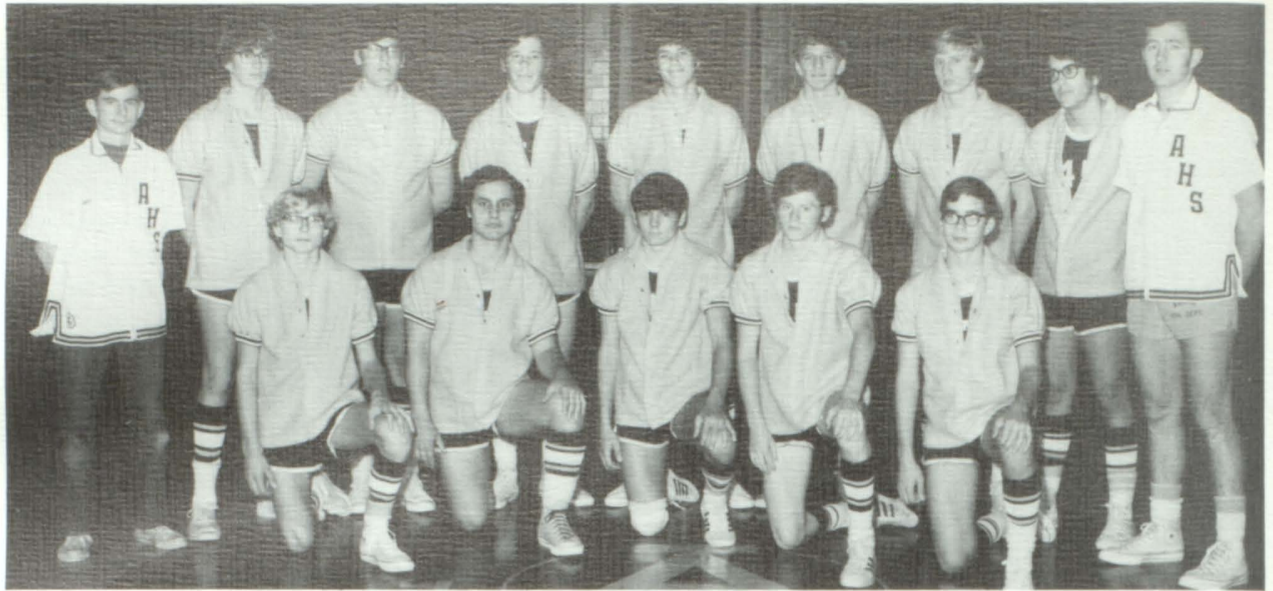

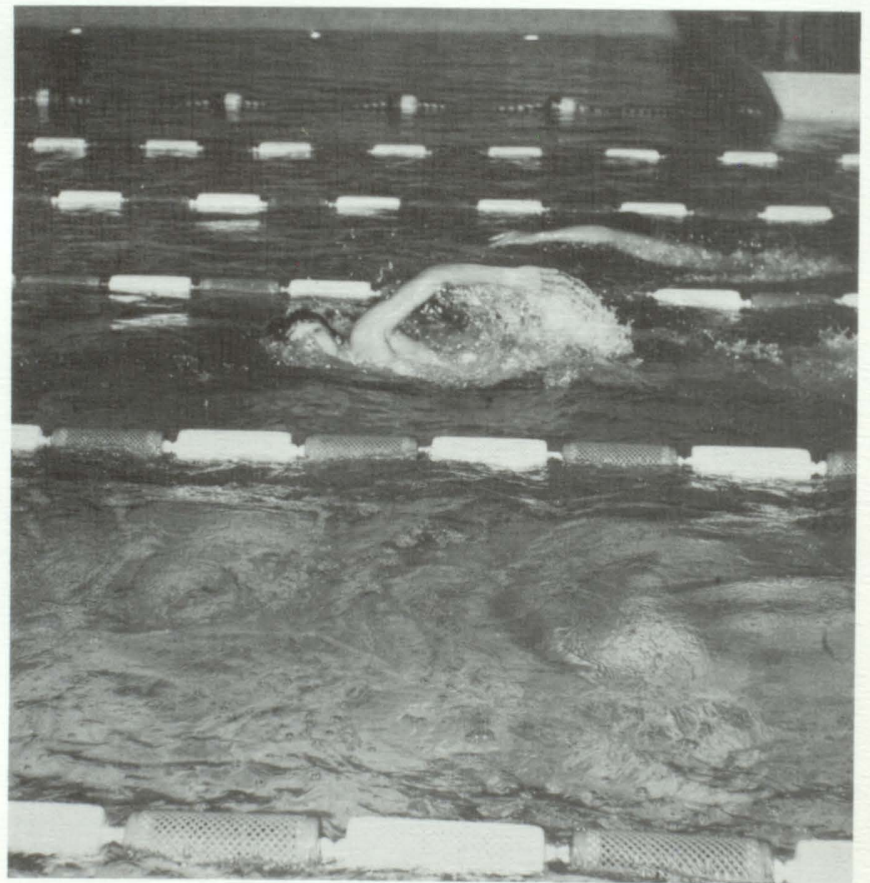

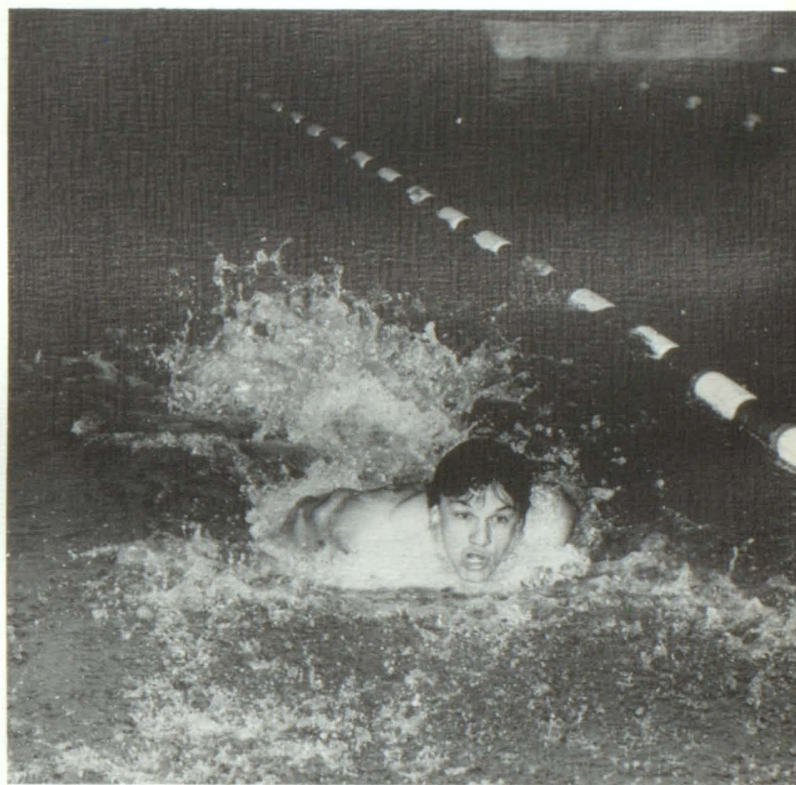
"Cuppy's Crampers" captained by Chris Jacques and Chuck Brooks completed their most successful season ever.

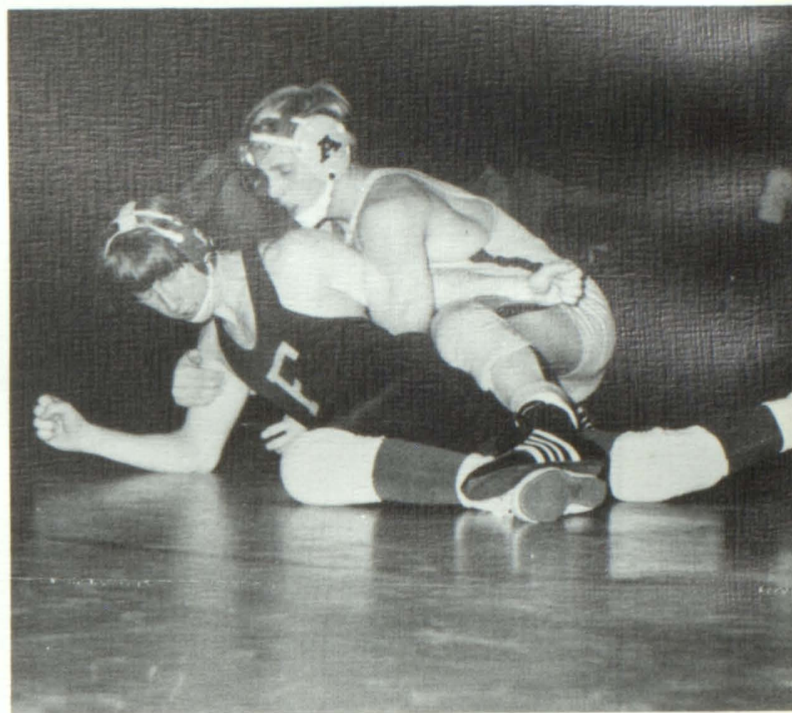

Also during the season the team participated in several Invitational Tournaments. At the Clarkston Invitational they had their best performance, taking first place.

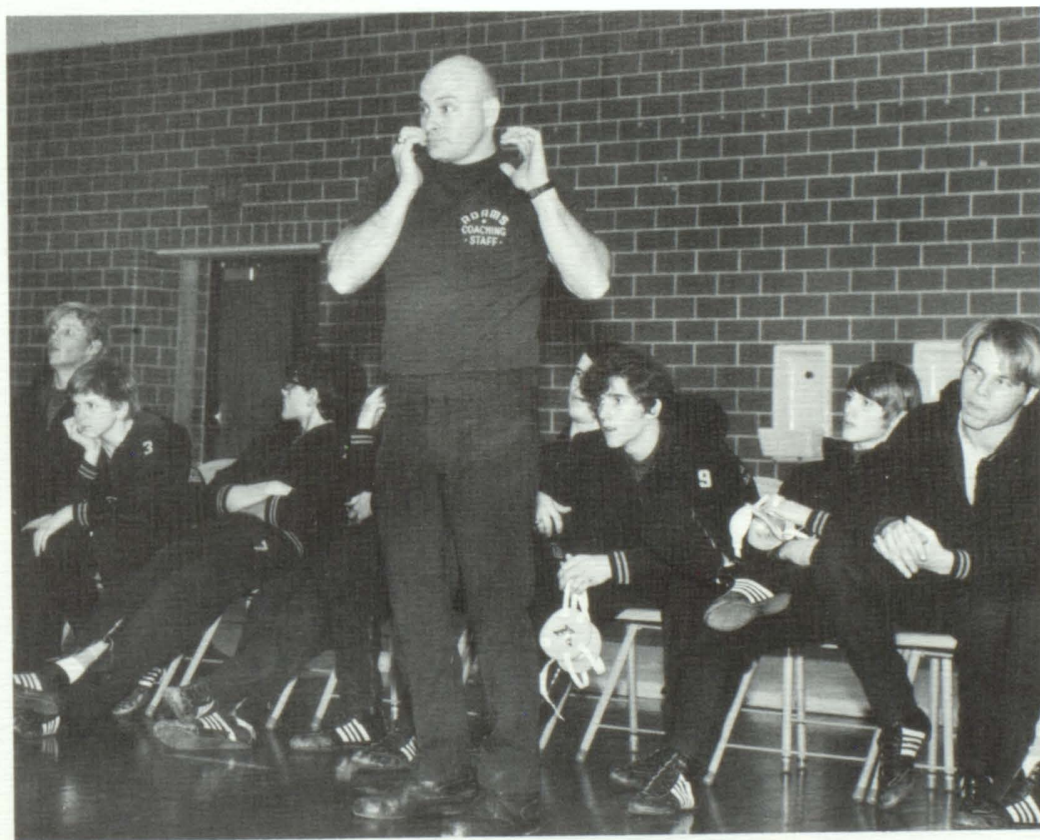

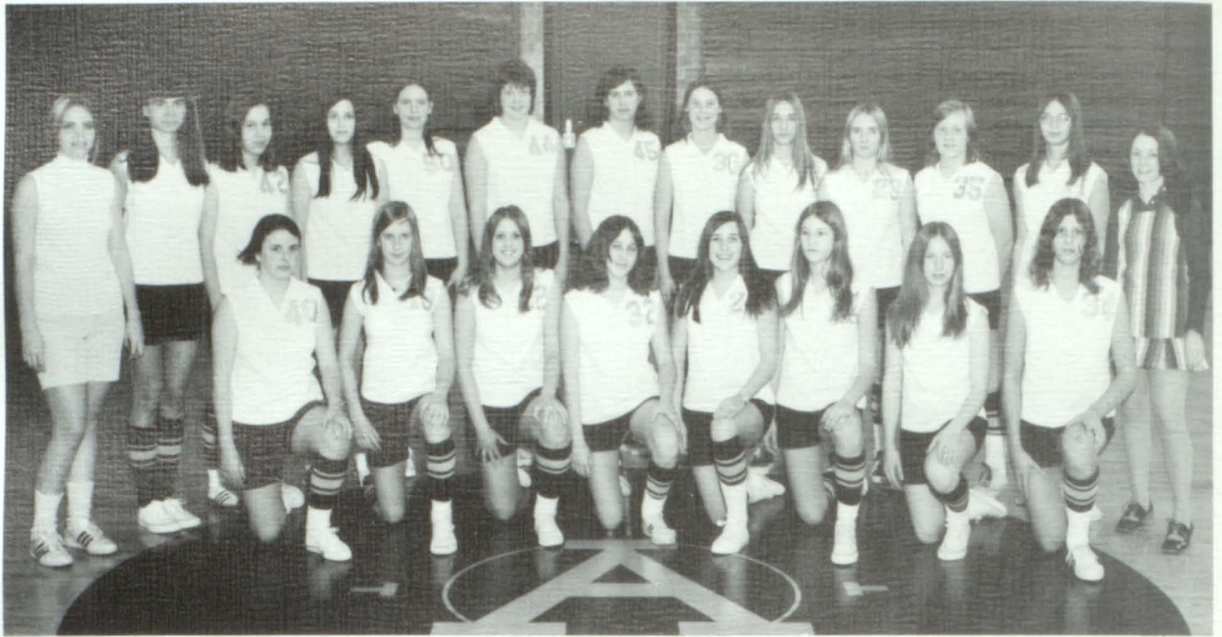
The last and largest meet of the season was the Regional, held at Pine Knob. Out of 17 teams in all, the girls placed 5th and the boys, 7th.

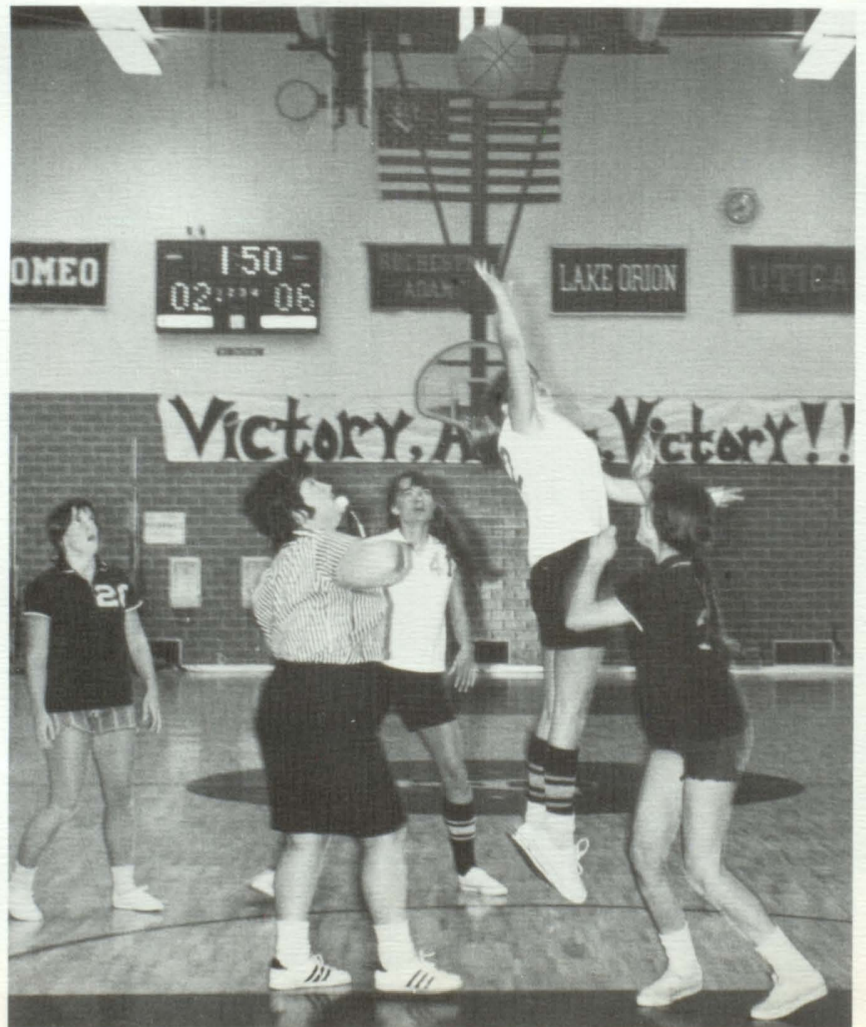

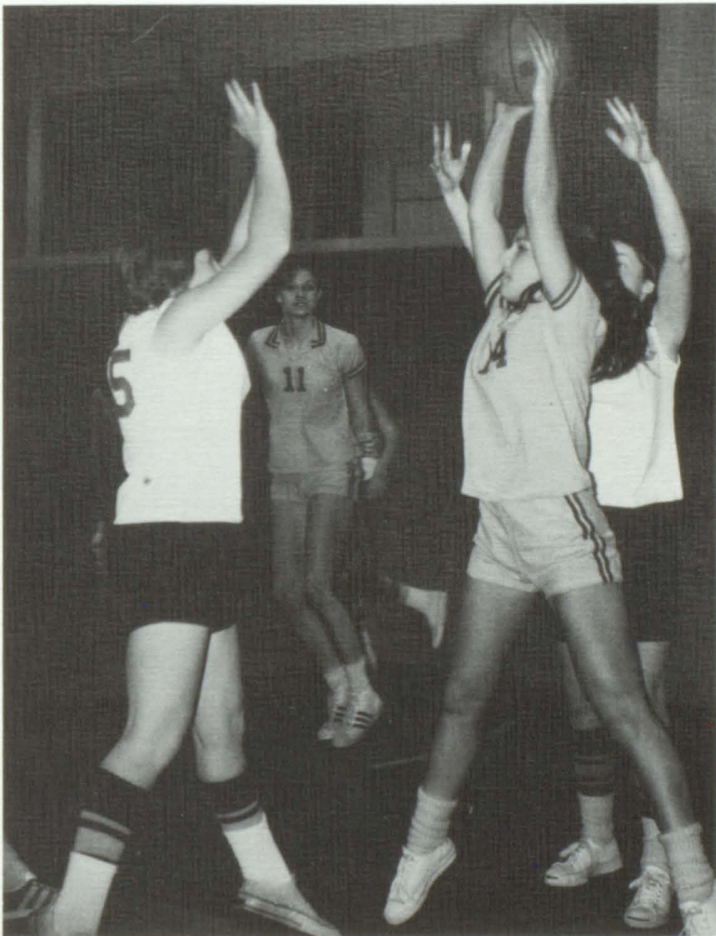

## Weaker Sex Proves Strength During Basketball Season

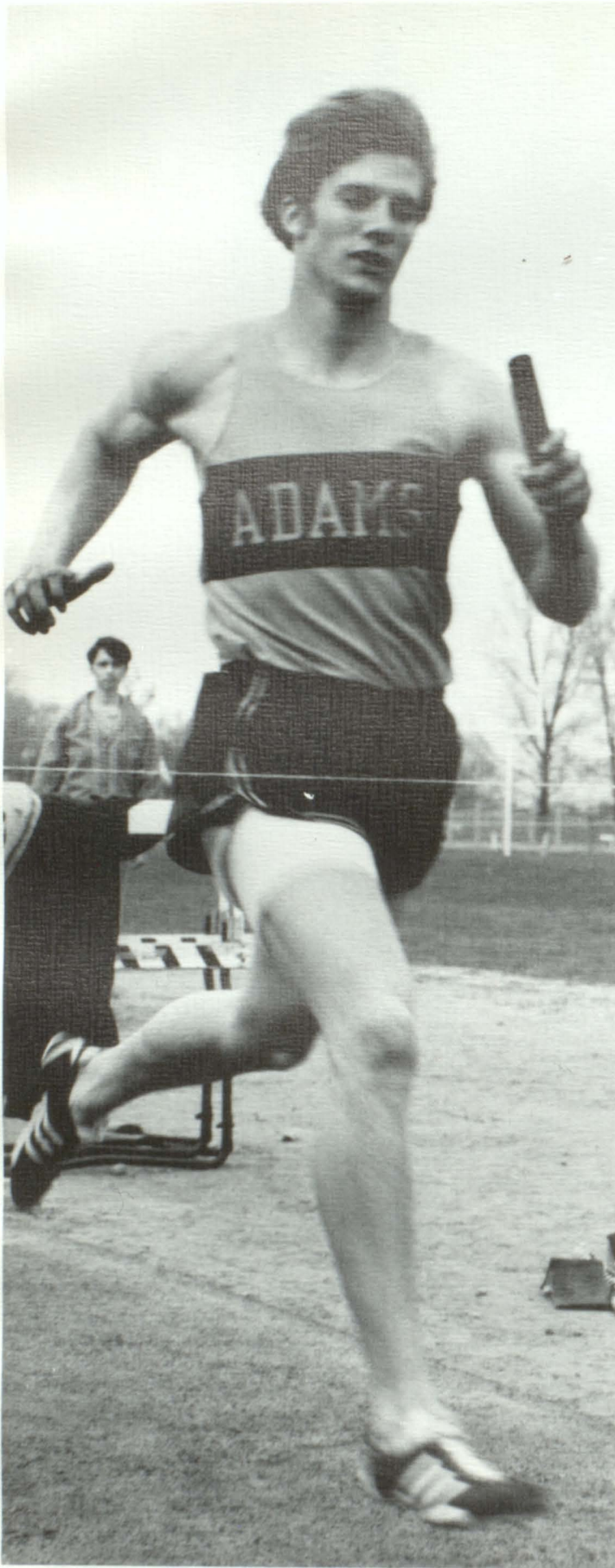

With more and more girls taking an active interest in sports, Adams should have some more successful teams in the future.

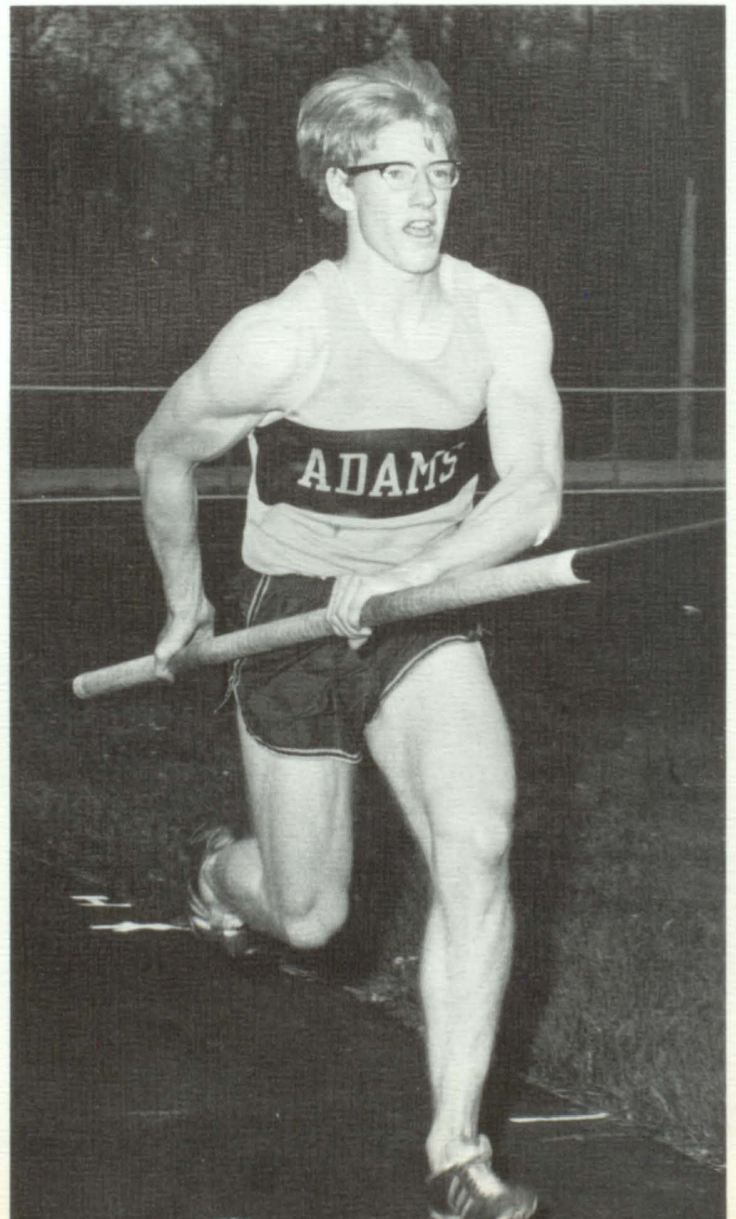

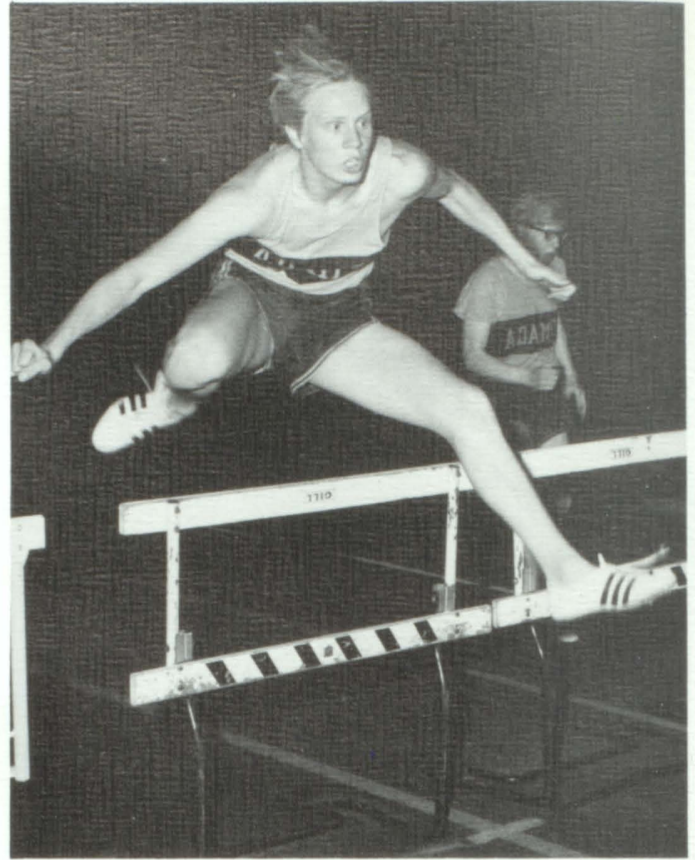
# Freshman Track Team Follows In Footsteps of Past AHS Teams

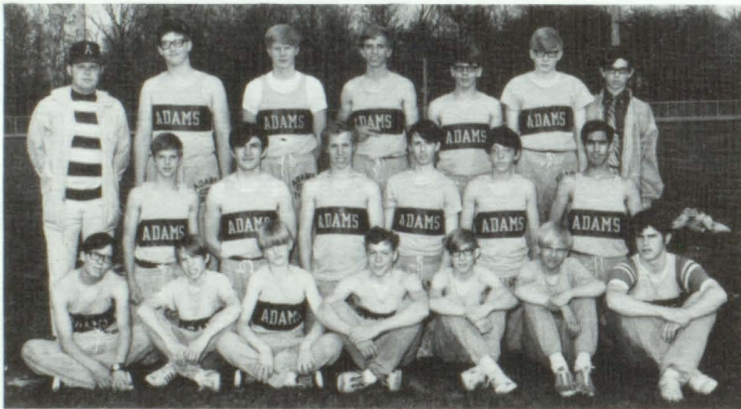

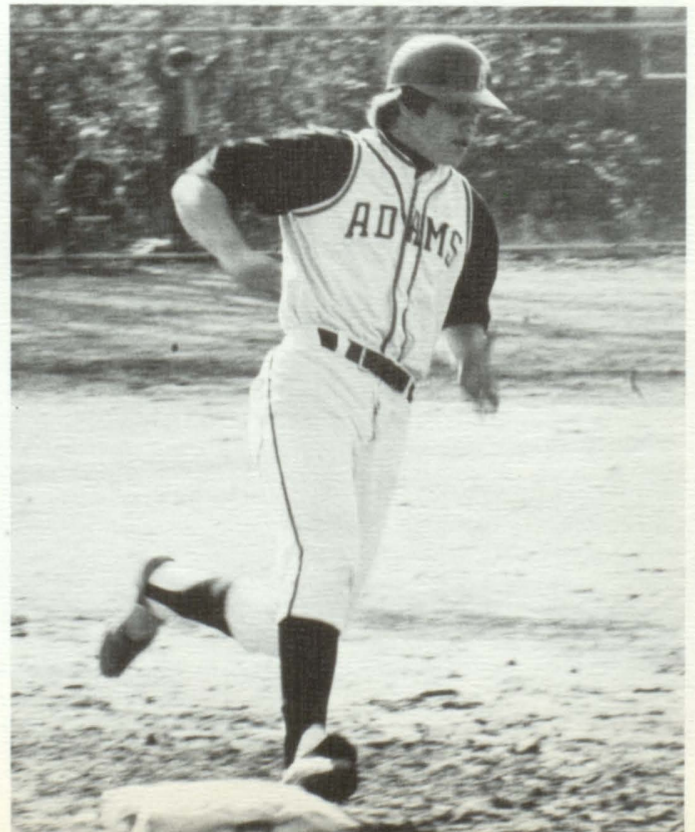

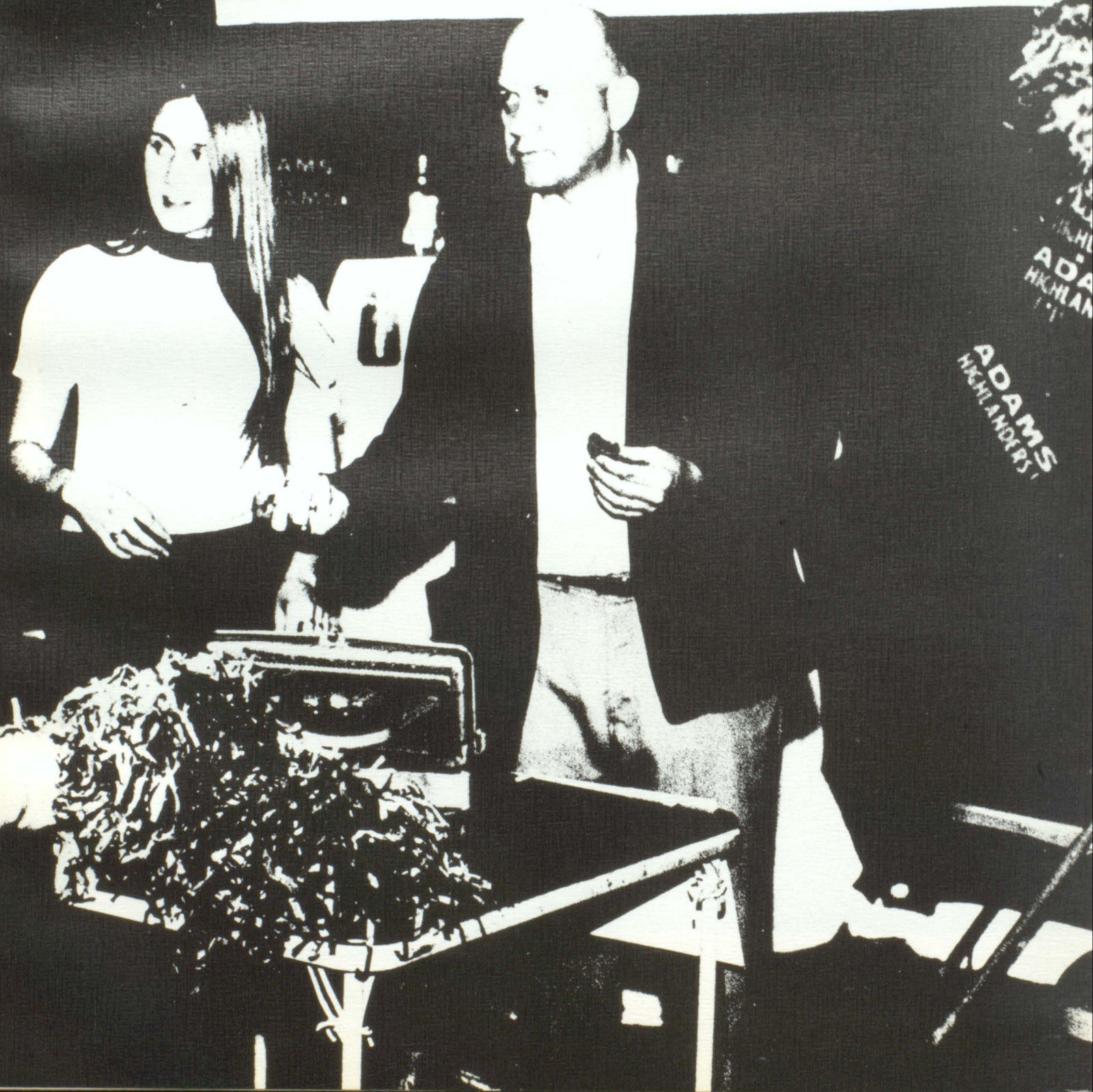

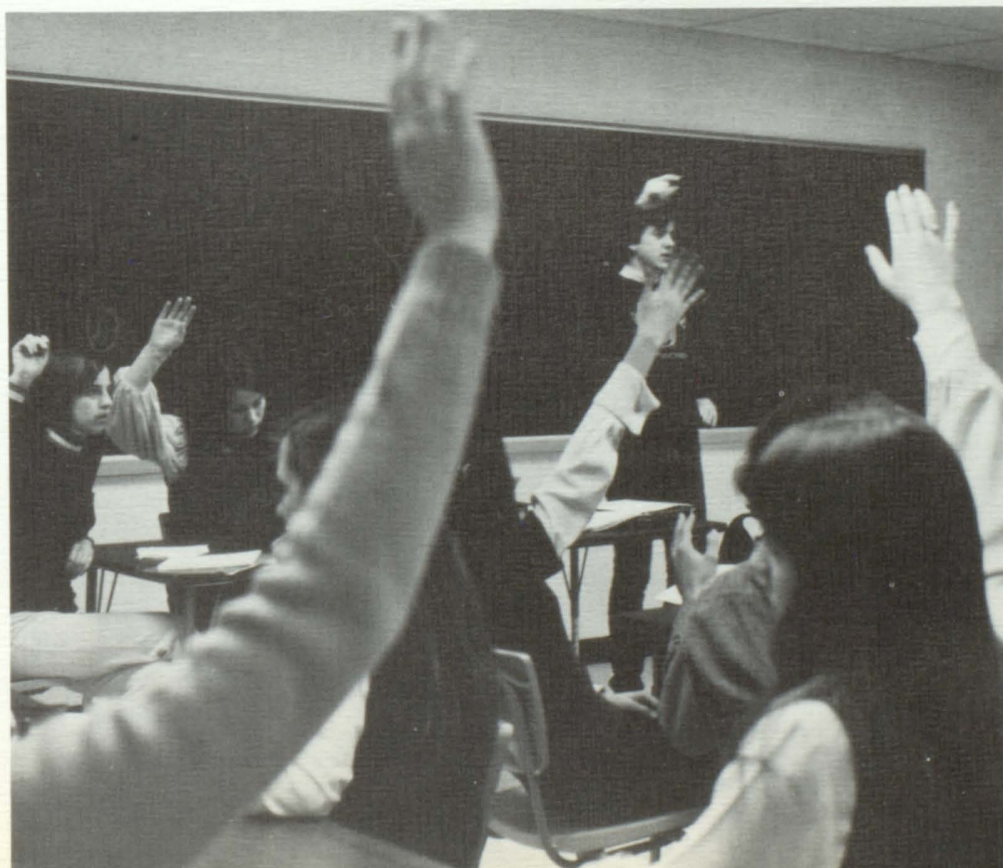

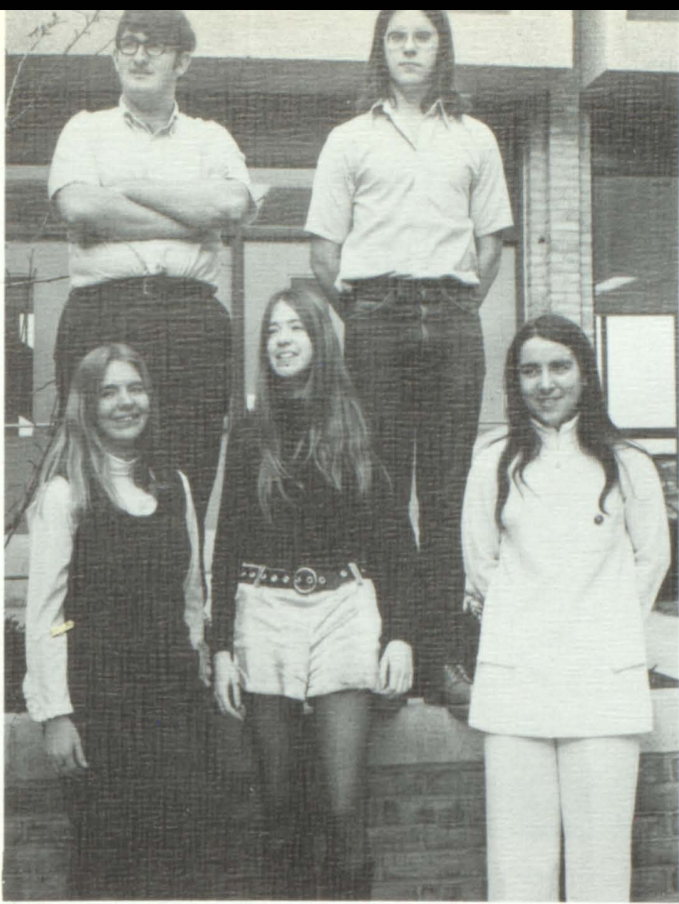

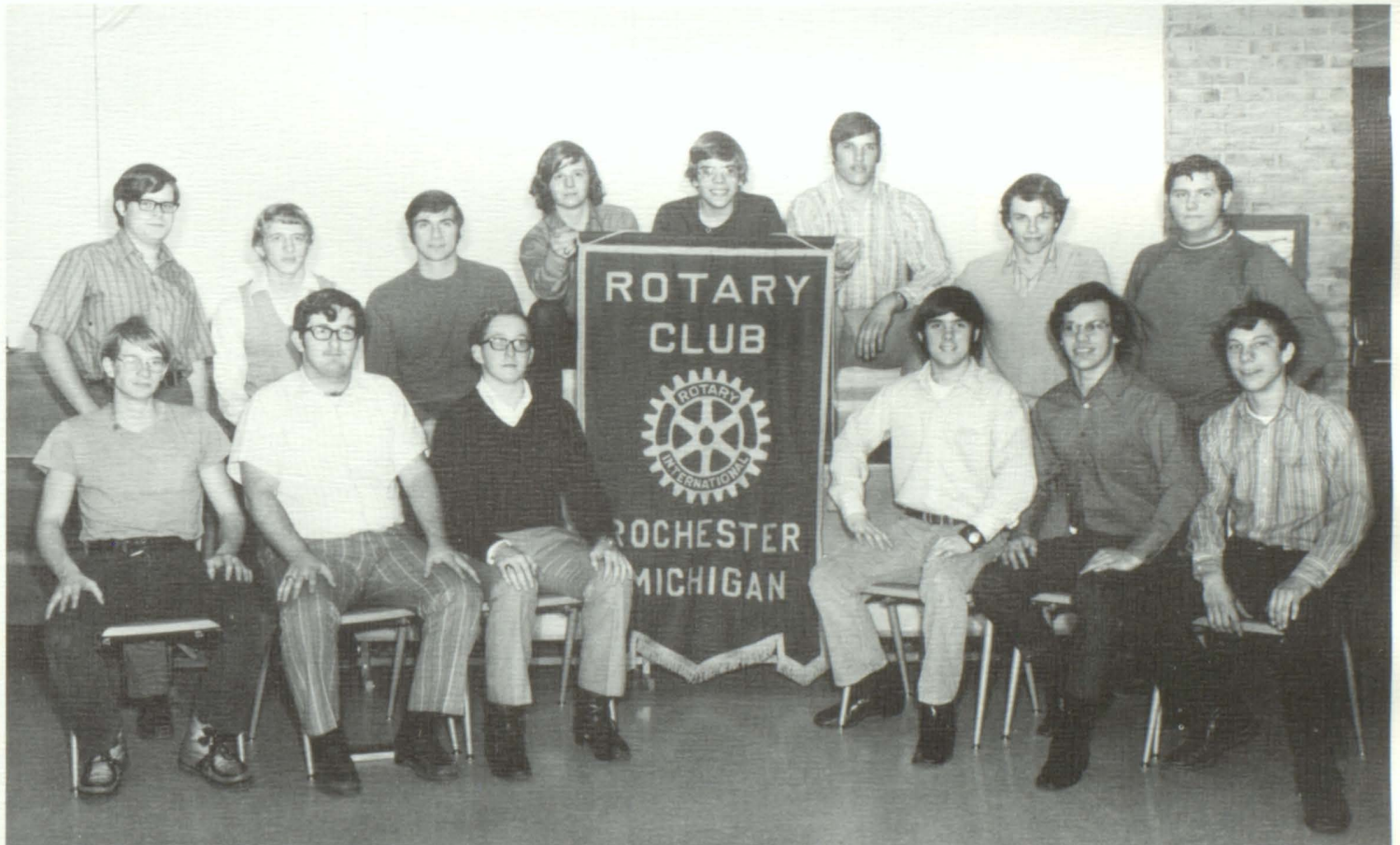

The Drama Club doesn't promise that you'll soar to stardom, but it's certainly a good way to get some acting experience.

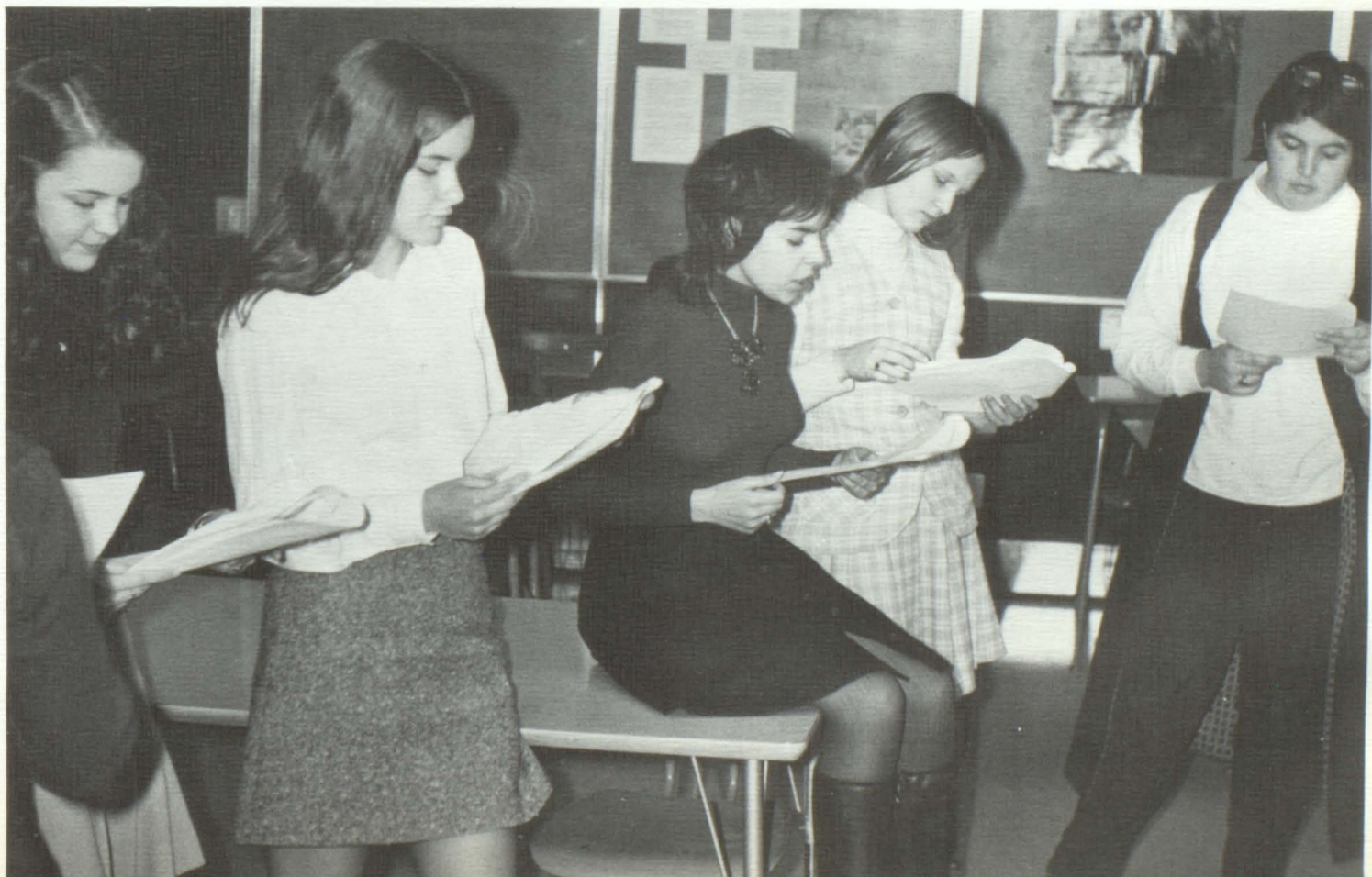

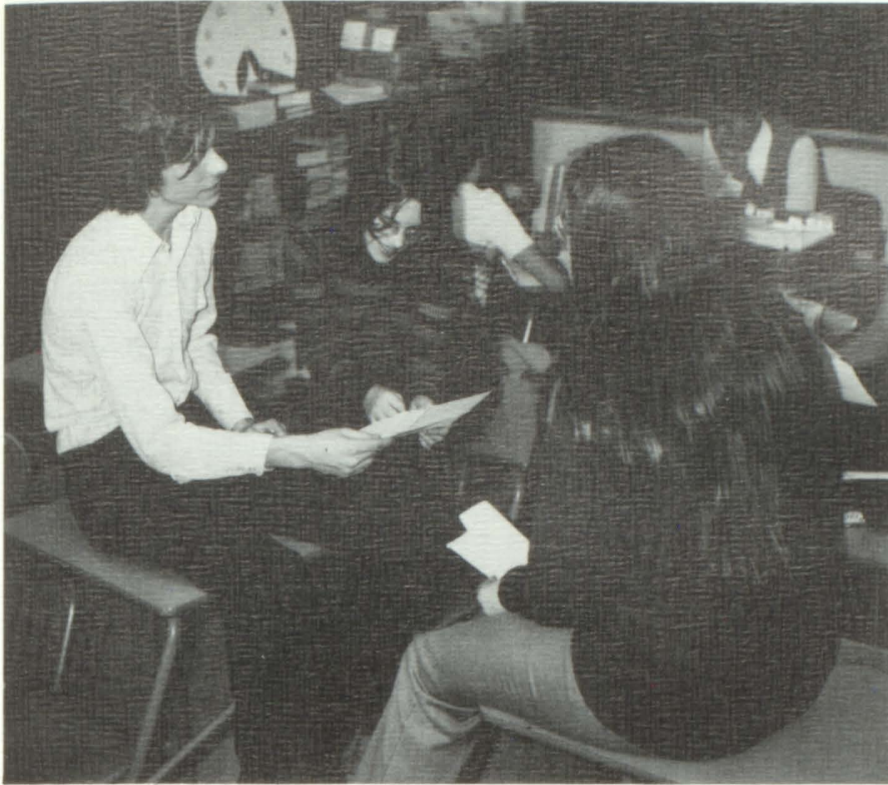

Many students would wonder what they were doing. Well, they are guys who have earned their Varsity letters and are going through their initiation to become Varsity Club members.

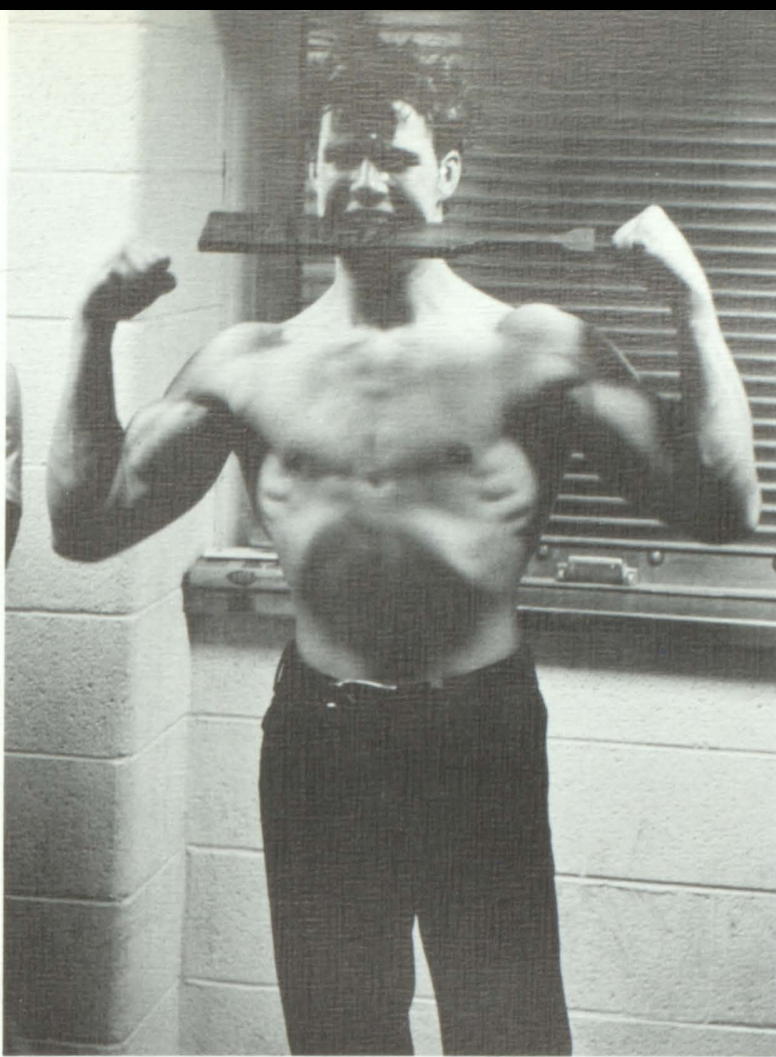

The Varsity Club, under the leadership of President Stan Ford, set up the concessions stand at all basketball games.

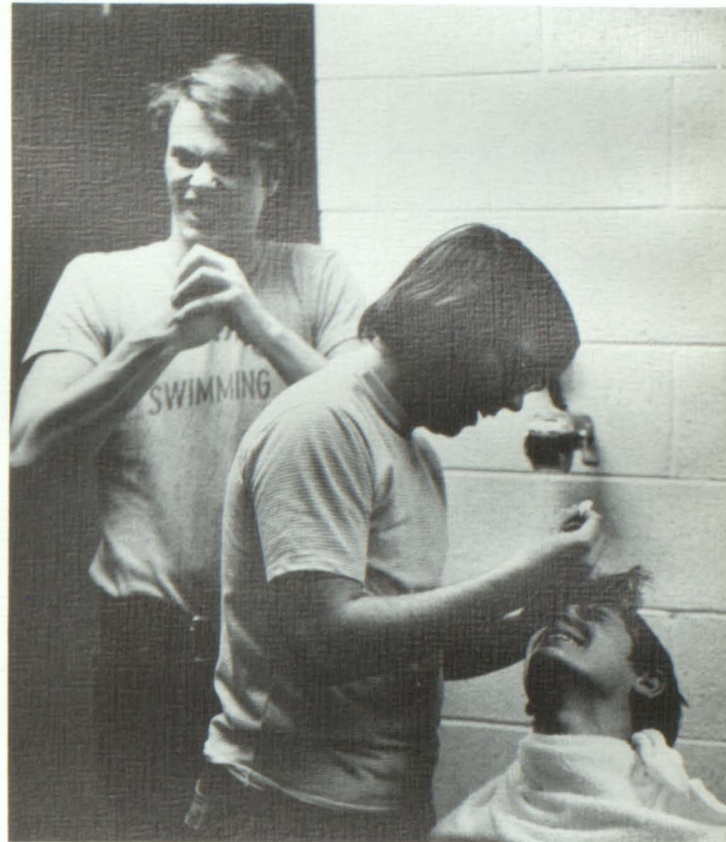
All the proceeds from these various fund raising projects were used toward the betterment of our school. The Club purchased such items as banners for the gym, trophies, and other items needed around school.
