SERVICE

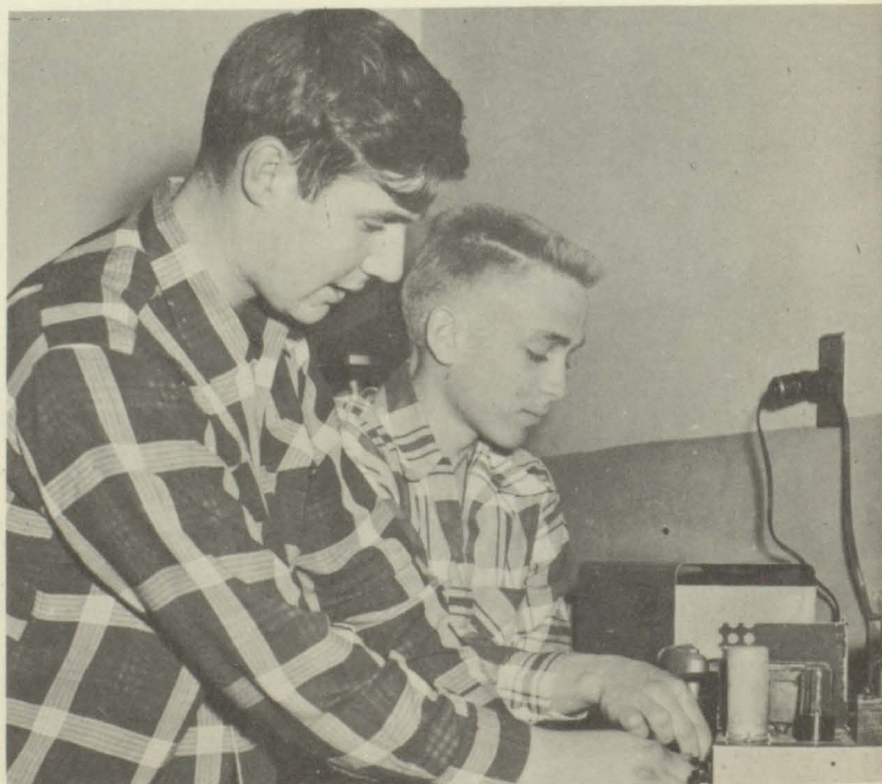
1. Willingness to render any service to the school and community, to do committee or staff work, to represent the school in inter-class or inter-school competition.

CHARACTER

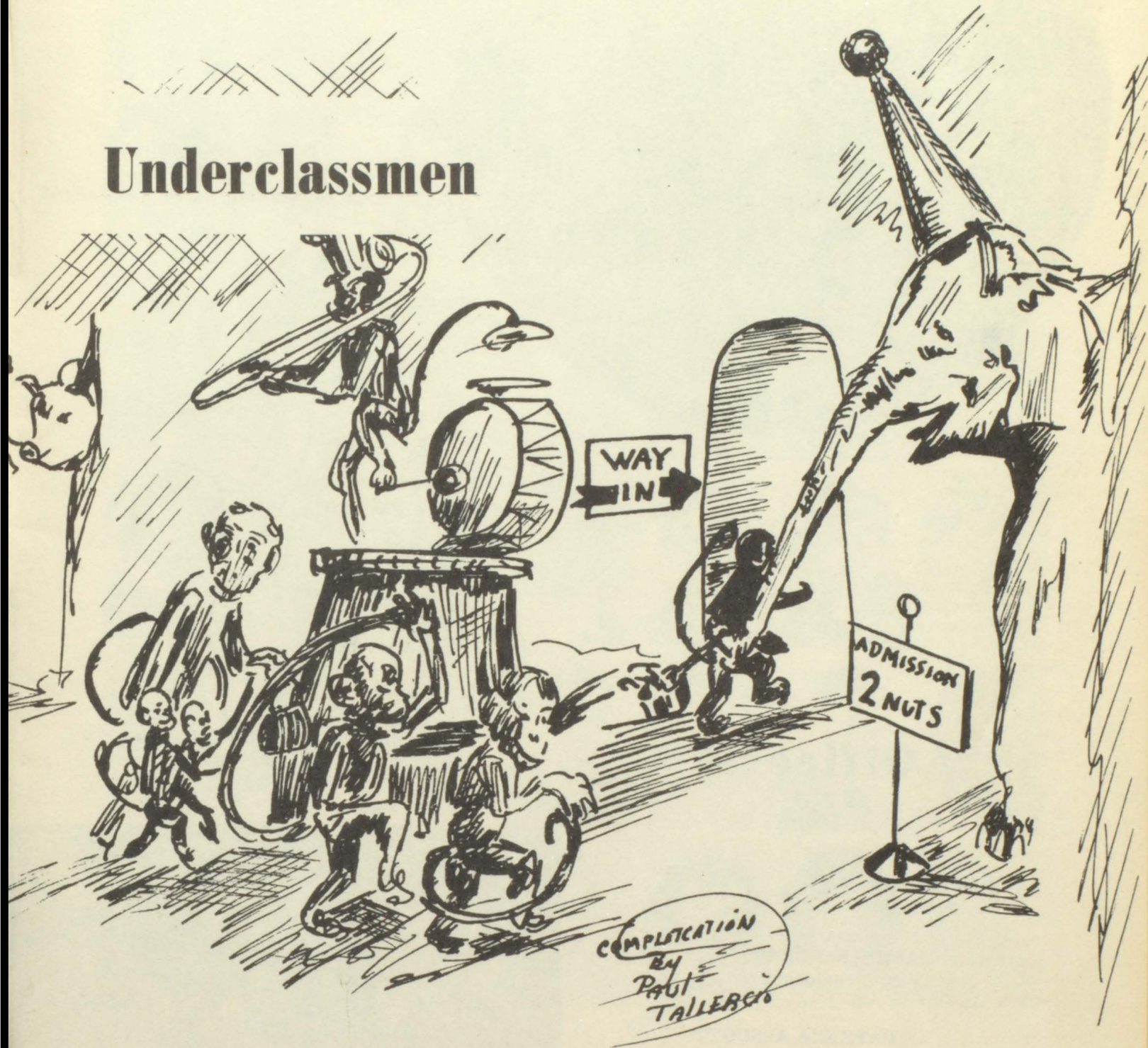
1. Meets individual pledges and responsibilities promptly to school and teachers.

5. Upholds principles of morality and ethics.

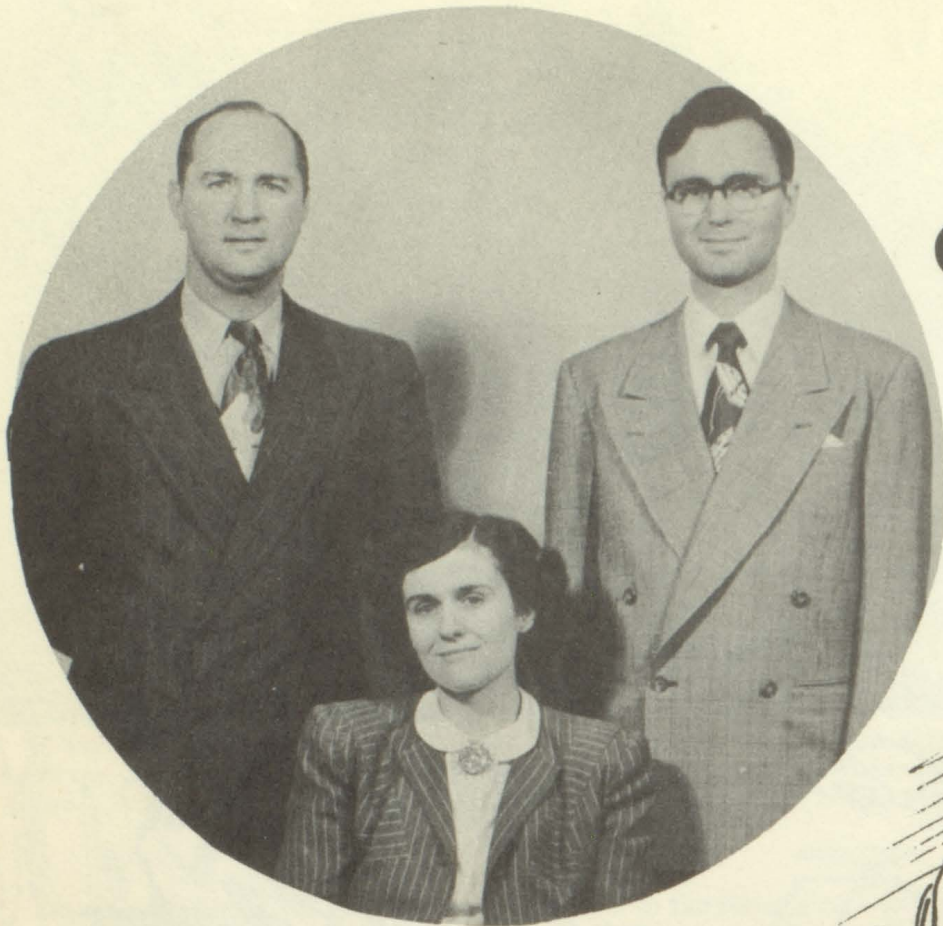

Switchboard Operators

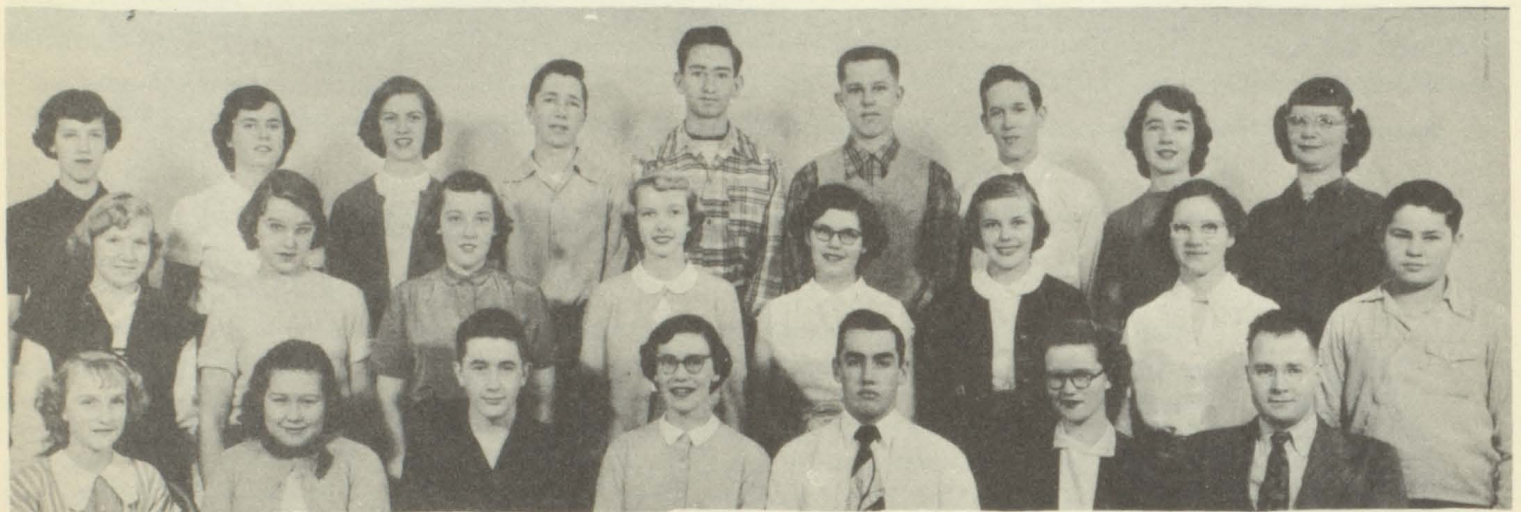
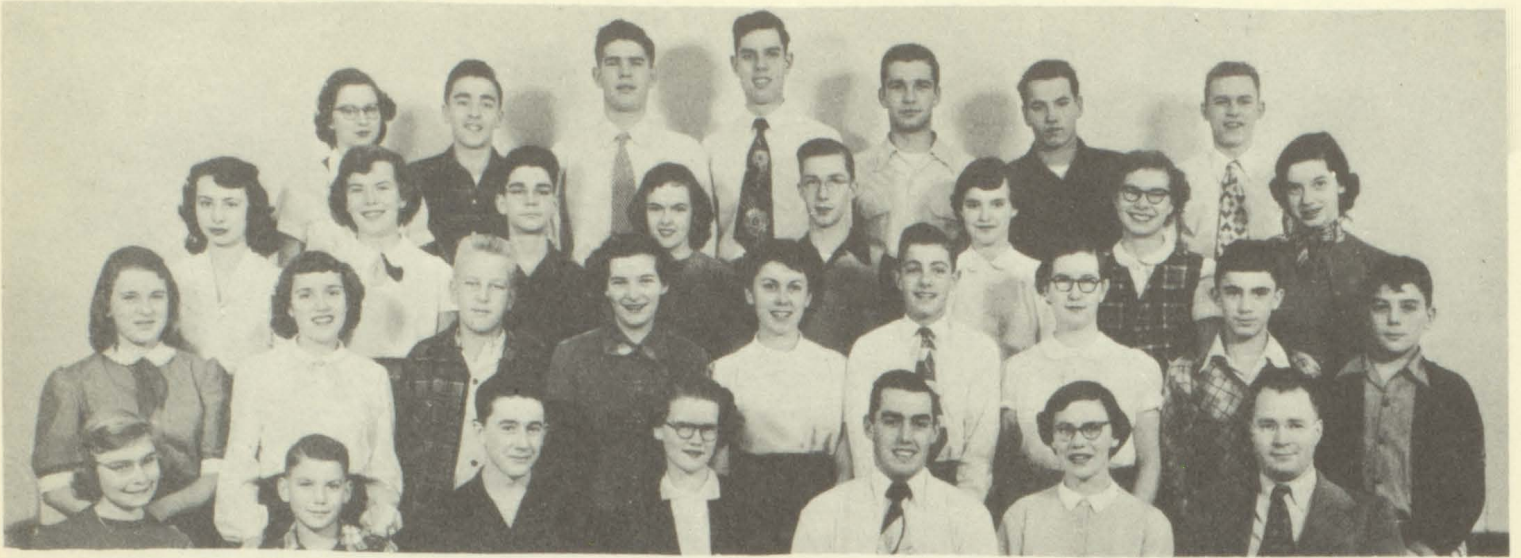
For a smoothly running communications system, careful selection of switchboard operators is necessary. The girls must be alert, accurate, and able to follow directions willingly.

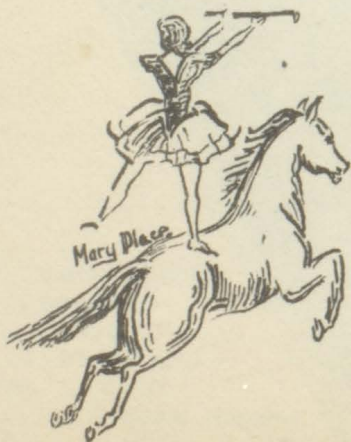

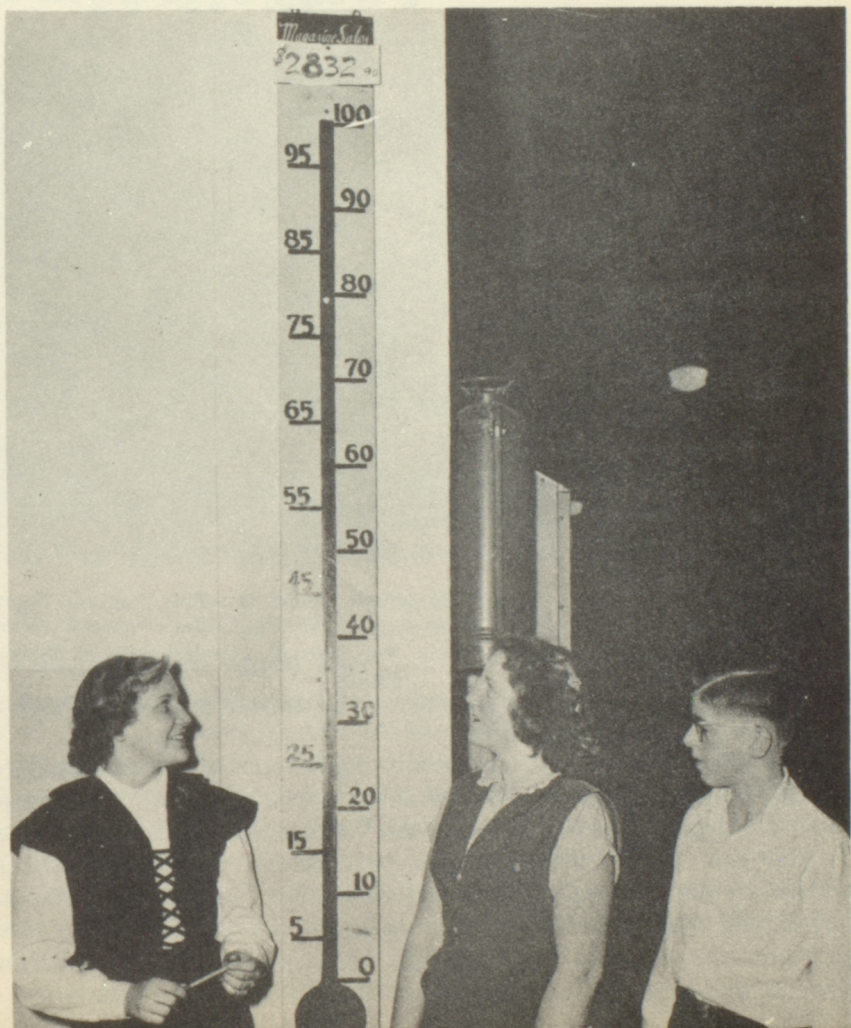

The Future Homemakers of America is an organization of girls studying home-making. The purposes are to further an interest in individual development, home and family life, international goodwill, and the homemaking program.

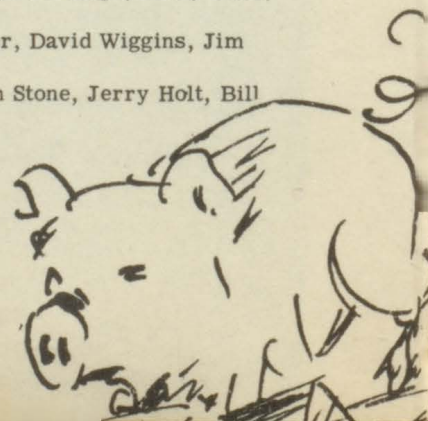

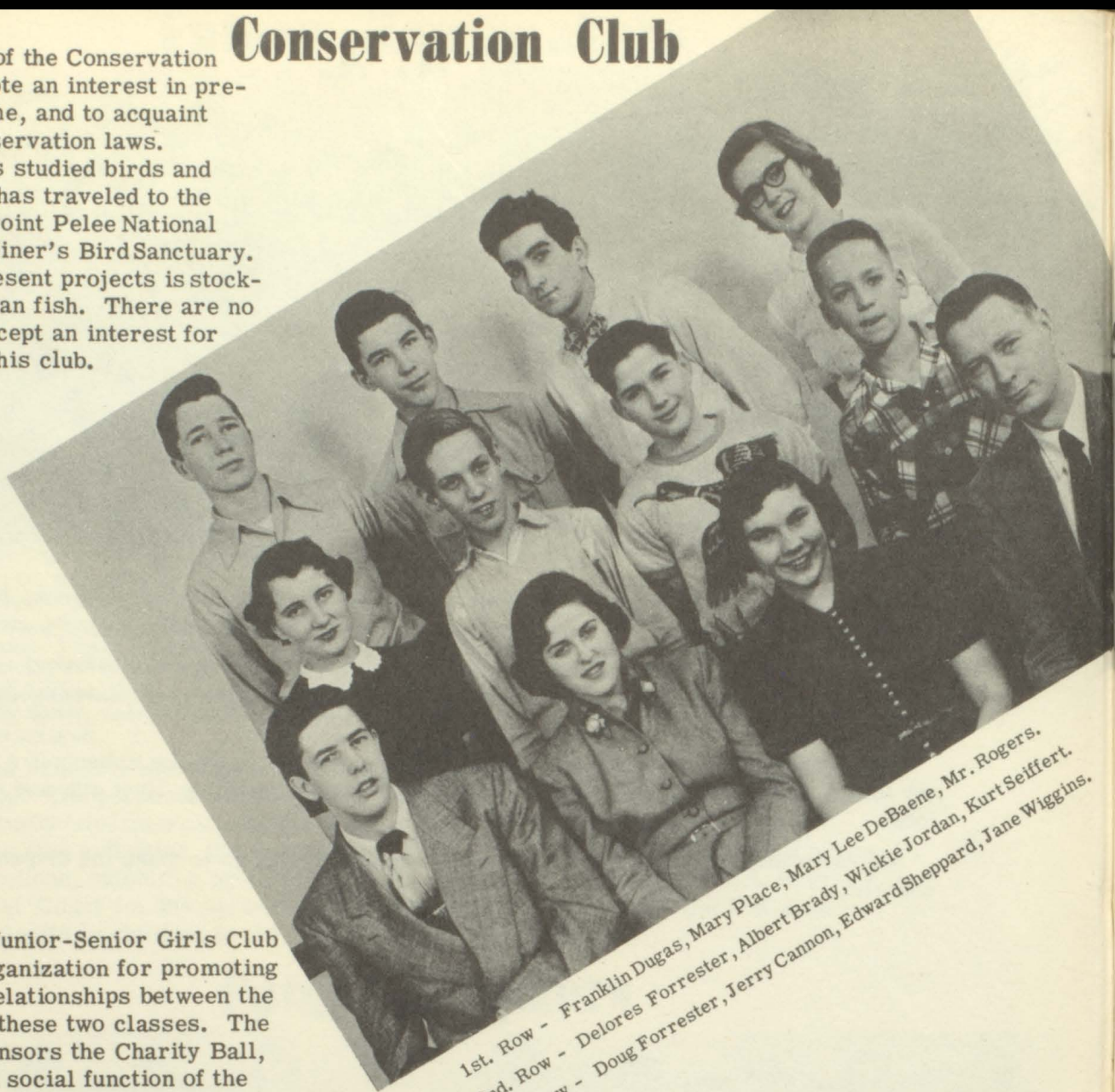

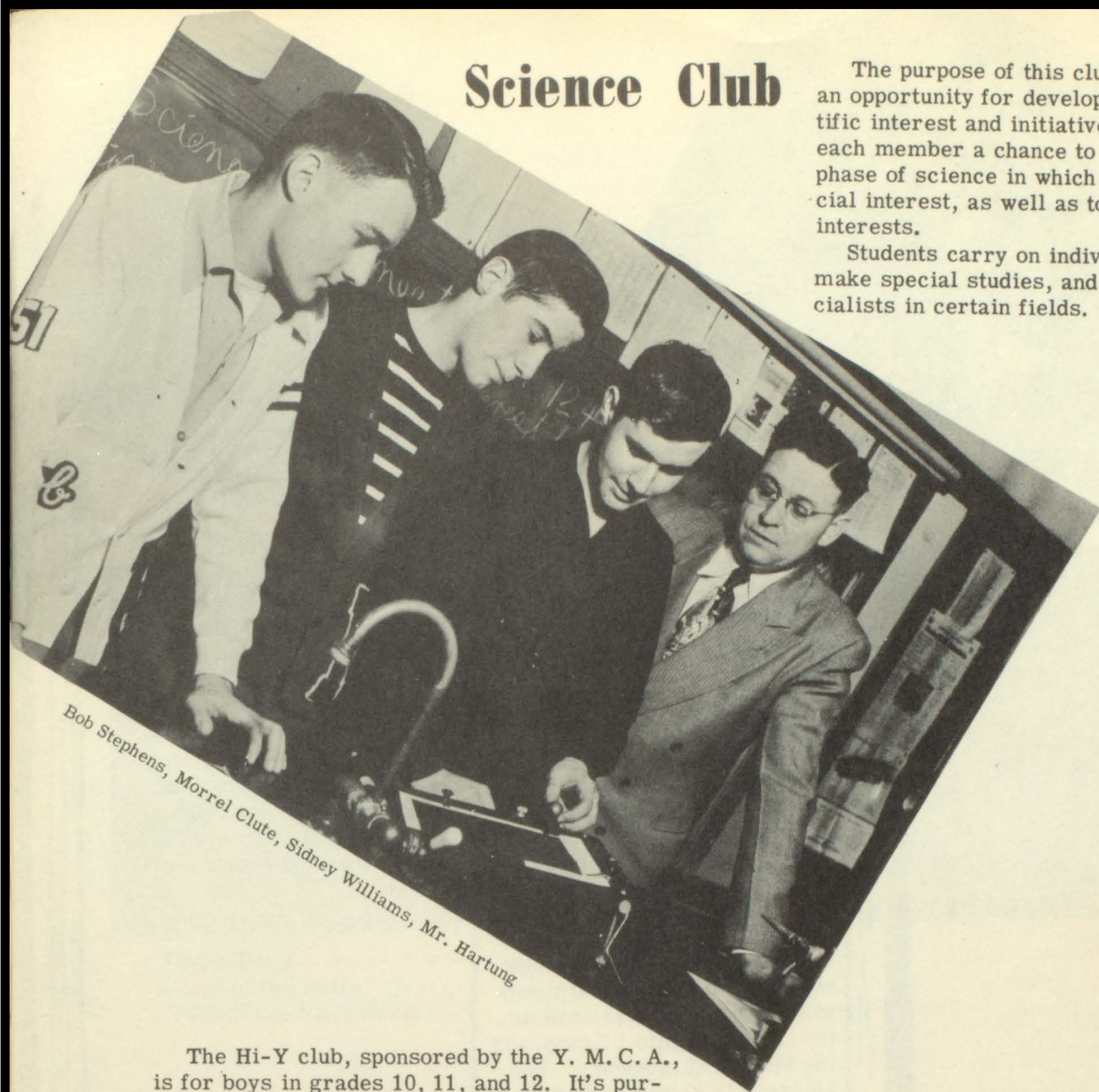

Students carry on individual research, make special studies, and listen to specialists in certain fields.



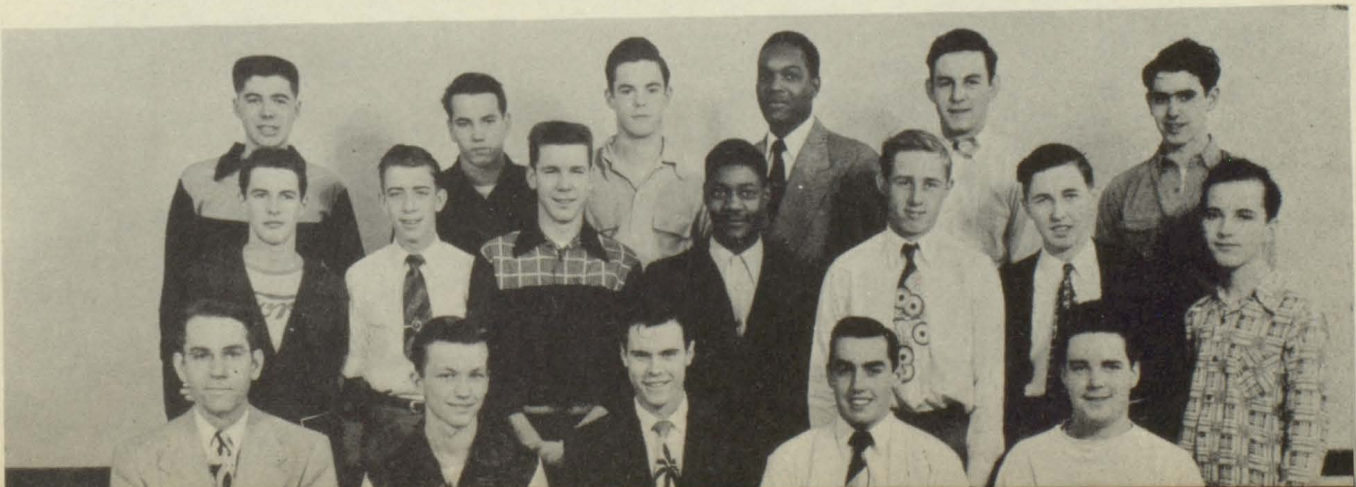

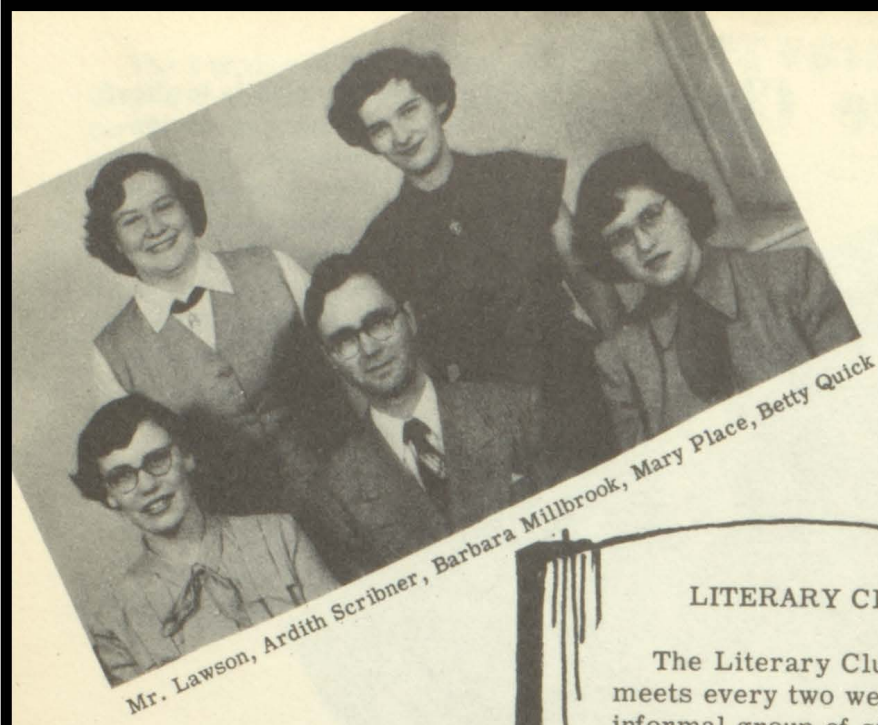

THE TALON

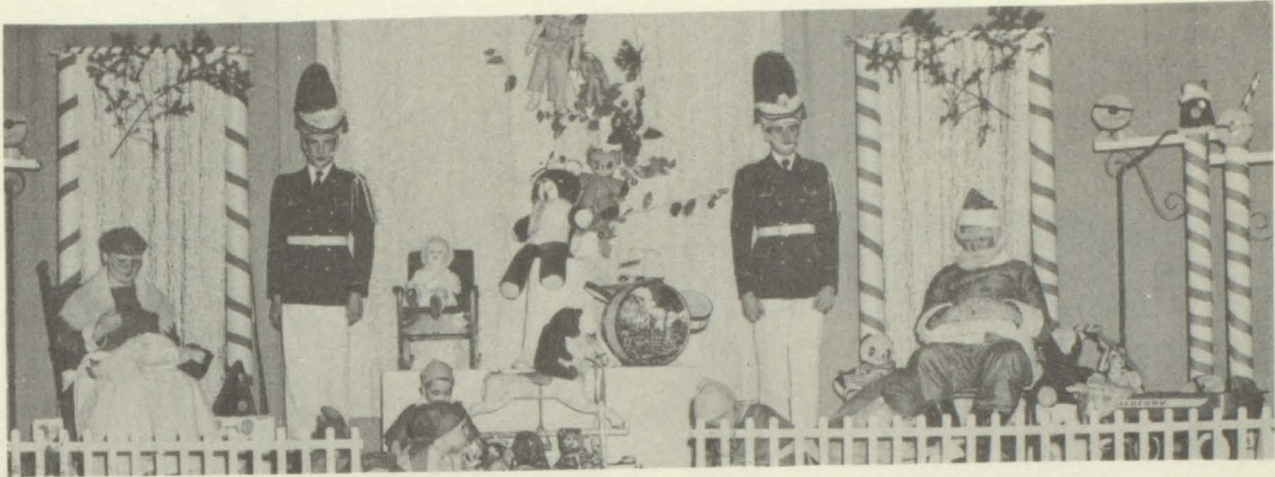
