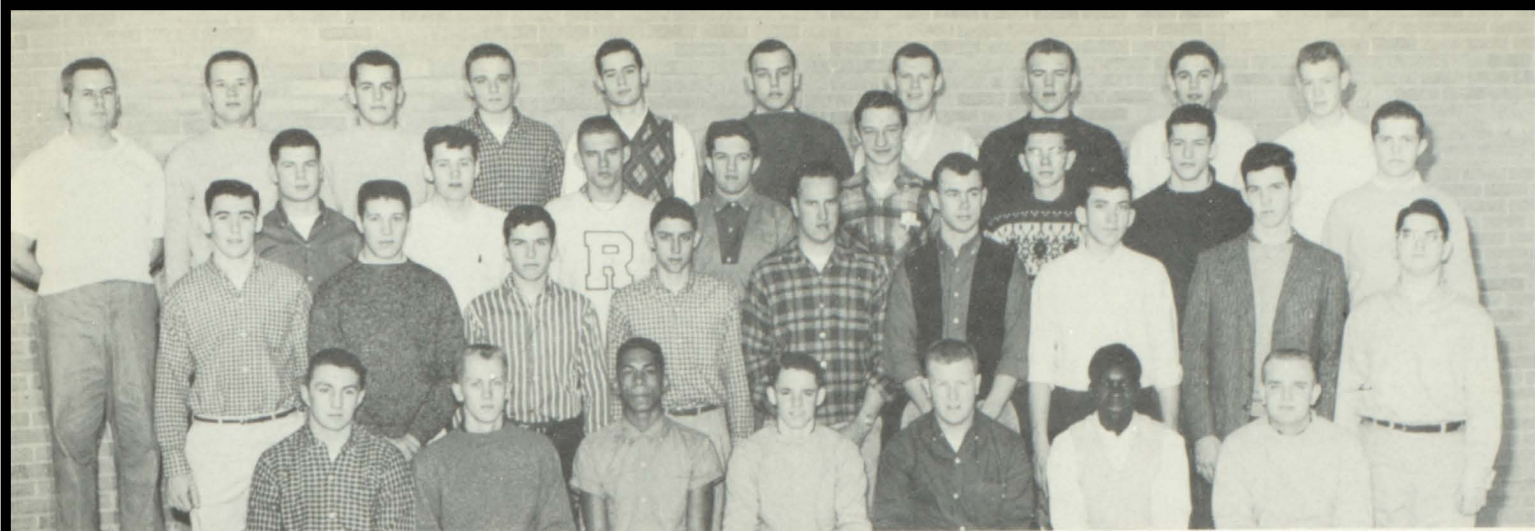
## Student Council

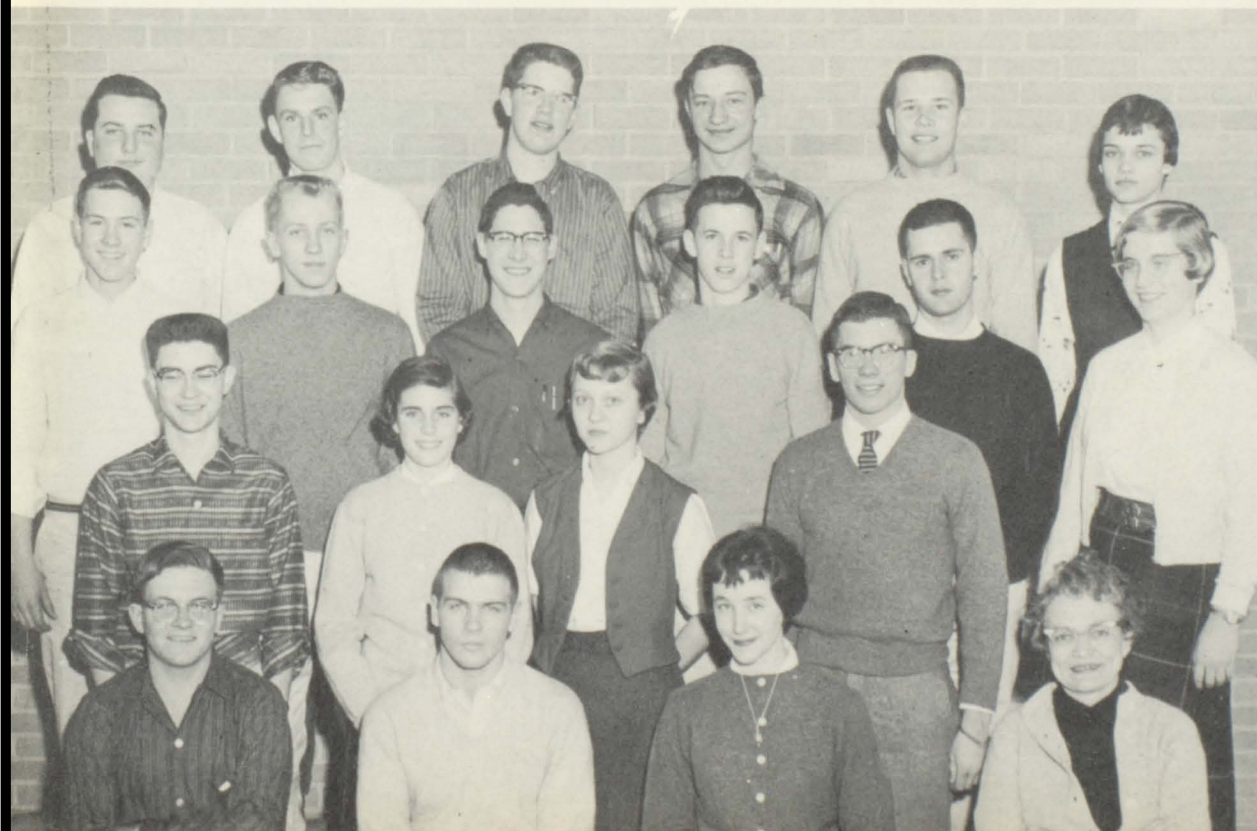
## Projectionist Club

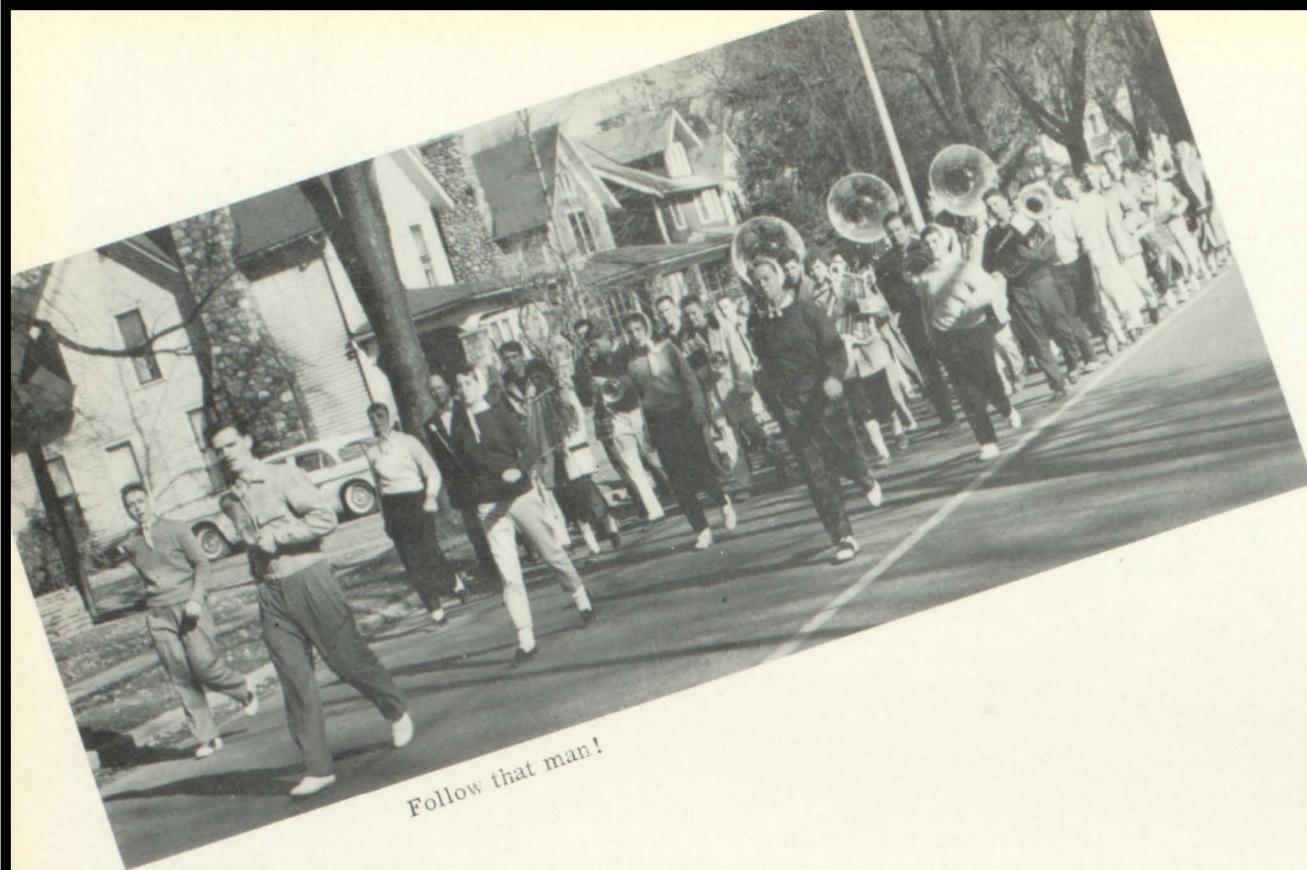

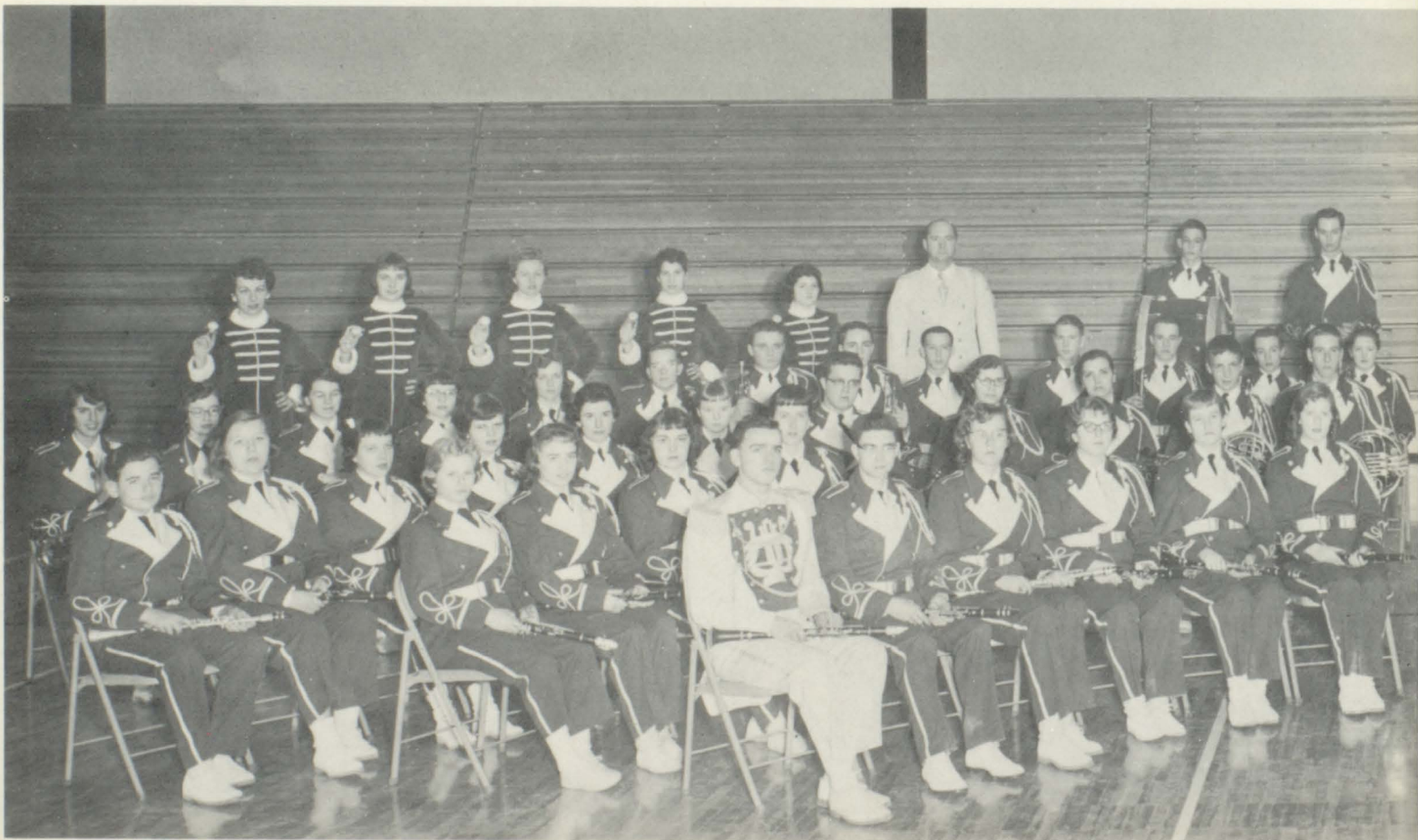

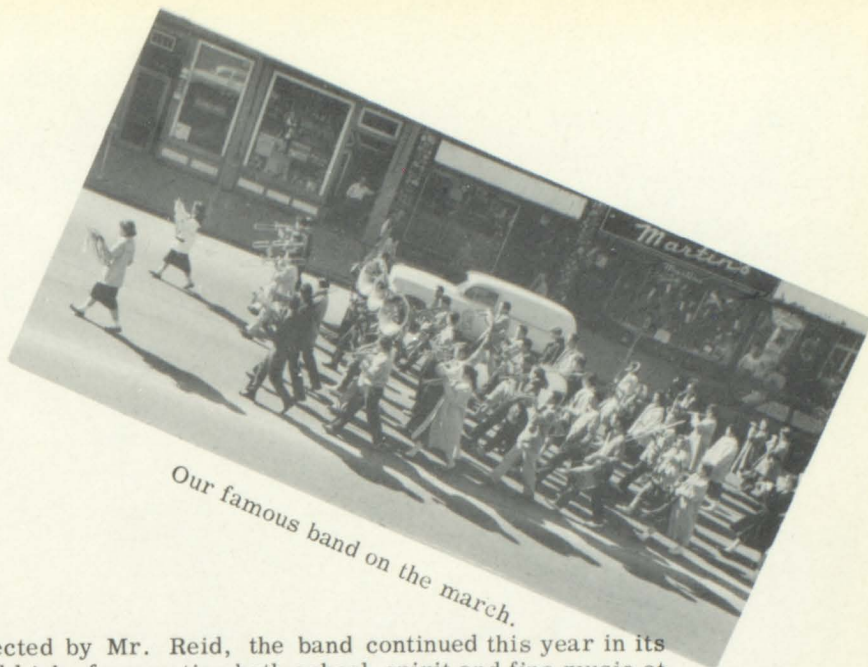




# Band
