THIS LIST IS MOST OF THE OPPORTUNITIES. IN EVERY CASE, TRAINING IS PROVIDED. YOUR SERVICE CAN BE A FEW **HOURS PER YEAR OR SEVERAL HOURS WEEKLY.**

IF YOU ARE INTERESTED IN VOLUNTEERING, STOP BY THE LIBRARY INFORMATION DESK FOR AN APPLICATION.

- FRIENDS LIBRARY STORE: Stop in to get an application. Job includes sales, assisting customers, housekeeping, opening and closing tasks.
- BOOK CART: Spend a 2 hour shift with a cart of books by the information desk, straighten shelves, collect cash, and answer questions. Work as often as you like within a schedule.
- <u>USED BOOK SORTING</u>: Sort donations from patrons, as well as library discards, and prepare them for the book sales. Work a few hours a week in the book room.
- <u>USED BOOK SALES</u>: Volunteer before the sales to set up the sales room, or for a shift on one of the sale days as cashier, bagger, or book arranger. You could even be the chairperson for a shift. Large sales occur 3 times a year, as well as additional smaller sales.
- HOLIDAY HOME TOUR: Annual event the second Sunday in November. Help with obtaining homes for the walk, arrange for sponsors, publicity, ticket sales, docent captain at a home, or be a docent yourself.
- MAILING: Label and sort mail to go out to all members 2 to 3 times a year.

From the Friends President...



First let me say that it is an honor to have been selected as the President of the Friends of the Rochester Hills Public Library for 2014. It's great to work with such a dedicated group

of volunteers. Speaking of volunteers.....

VOLUNTEER Webster's defines a volunteer as "a person who chooses freely to do something". The Friends of the Library defines volunteers as the heart and soul of our operation. Volunteers are the reason our activity is able to function and flourish. Our volunteers are male and female, short and

tall, computer literate or not, and span ages from high school student to senior citizen. Some are in school, some work, and others are retired.



Some volunteer daily, some weekly, some monthly, and some only once a year, but all are valuable.

Here are some of the areas that get handled by our volunteers: working in the Friends Library Store, staffing the Used Book Cart in the Library lobby area, sorting used books to get them prepared for our various Used Book Sales, working a Used Book Sale, volunteering at the annual Holiday Home Tour and other fund raisers, creating and mailing the biannual Friends Newsletter, and serving on the Friends Board of Directors. There are many tasks involved in each of the areas mentioned, and elsewhere in this issue is a more detailed listing of what's involved in each area and how you can get involved. We are anxious to have you join us.

Your Friends Board of Directors consists of nine individuals elected by you at the Annual Meeting in October. We meet monthly along with the Library Director and the heads of our various departments (store, used book sales, etc.) to plan the fund raising events that the Friends conduct each year. And we've been pretty successful. For the last 3 years we've been able to give the Library a gift of at least \$125,000 each year to fund various events and purchase needed equipment. This year, in addition to our \$125,000 pledge, we have given an additional \$50,000 to support the Library expansion mentioned in the Director's report.

Most of the money we raise is from the Used Book Sales, but our other fund raisers provide money as well. This year we held a new event for us in March called Wine, Wit & Wisdom. Be sure to read about it in another part of the

newsletter. We hold a Friends Membership Drive at the Library every April, and upcoming events include our second GM Heritage Center tour in May and our Holiday Home Tour in November. We also have 2 or 3 other events in the planning stages, so stay tuned.

The focus of the Friends of the Library is to do whatever it takes to help make the Rochester Hills Public Library be the best it can be for you and our community. So far we've been doing a very good job thanks to our volunteers, but there is always more to do. Remember, whatever your skills, abilities or desires, we have a position you can fill.

brand new fund raising activity the evening of March 8 at the library and were




thrilled with the numbers who attended, as well as by the obvious enjoyment of the participants.

evening was very


pleasurable. I believe it is an event the Friends should host again in 2015!"

Friends New Board Members

Tom Asmus is the newest Friends Board Member and has lived in Oakland Township for 18 years. Tom spent 30 years at Chrysler Engineering, in both Highland Park and Auburn Hills, as a scientist and engineer involved in reducing engine exhaust emissions and fuel consumption. Following his Chrysler retirement, he accepted a professorial position at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor where he taught an advanced engineering course. After 5 years of teaching, he retired again as the 65-mile commute started to become too much.

He and his wife Mary became involved in the Oakland Township Historical Society and participated in the move and rebuild of the Flumerfelt barn now located at the Cranberry Lake Farm on Predmore Rd (one of the homes on last years Holiday Home Tour). He was recruited to rebuild the historic logging wheels in front of the Paint Creek Cider Mill in Goodison, and then to repair the water wheel at the Mill. When not involved in Oakland Township projects, he worked with The Detroit Science Center (now The Michigan Science Center), Habitat for Humanity, and First Robotics at Wayne State University. As a member of the National Academy of Engineering and the Society of Automotive Engineers, he has occasionally been involved in studies related to energy usage.

Looking back, Tom concludes that his experience as an early Peace Corps Volunteer in a very remote village in Honduras helped him to accept risks and see them as adventures. He is looking forward to more adventures working with the Friends to support the library.

recently joined the Board of Directors of the Friends of the Rochester Hills Public Library. She has had a lifetime passion for libraries and is one of the most active users of the RHPL. Kimberly is very involved in the Rochester area community and frequently volunteers for and supports programs at the library, as well as for Rochester Area Youth Assistance. She is also an



adult literacy tutor with the Oakland Literacy Council and regularly tutors students at the Rochester Hills Public Library.

Kimberly has been working in various legal positions since 1992 and currently works as a legal assistant at a law firm in Birmingham supporting civil litigation in all state and federal courts. She attended Macomb Community College working full time while going to school.

Kimberly lives in Rochester with her husband Jeff, who is vice-chairman of the Oakland County Board of Commissioners.



Whenever I think of the Friends the first thing that comes to my mind is "Thank You!" I know I say it over and over; but we just couldn't be the kind of library we are without your support.

As you probably know, the library will be doing some major construction this year. We have just completed our

new terrazzo stairs and work will begin in May on the expansion in the drive-up book return area.

The first part of the project will be the construction of a two-story addition that will greatly improve the functionality of the drive-up. I promise you will be able to pick up and return materials without hitting the building, scratching your car or getting out of your car. It has taken us 22 years to get around to fixing the problem, but the time is here at last! The second floor of the new addition will be finished thanks to a \$50,000 gift from you, the Friends of the Library. The space will be used for book sale online sales and storage. The large space will allow us to consolidate all of this activity into one area and to provide safe and secure storage.

The second part of the project is the installation of an automated materials handling system. This conveyor driven system will accept returned materials from the outside drive-up area, and will automatically check them in and sort them into bins for re-shelving. This should shorten the turnaround time on returned materials from 24 - 48 hours and will allow us to get more use out of our books. The sooner materials are checked in and re-shelved, the sooner people can borrow them.

The third part of the construction project involves major repairs on the south parking lot. The black top will be removed and the aggregate layer or rock base material will be compressed and supplemented where necessary before the lot is re-surfaced. I think we can promise that there will be no pot holes in our parking lot next year!

So there is a lot of change coming, but the one thing that does not change is our deep appreciation for all that you do for the library. Whether you are here volunteering five days a week, working on special events or paying your Friends' membership dues, you make a real difference in what this library can do. Thank you!
